A Letter from the Board President

I would be remiss if I didn't start my reflection on the past year with the announcement that 2014-15 was Dr. Hickman's last full year as the IHSA Executive Director. Marty will conclude his 25th year at the IHSA, and 14th as Executive Director, in January, 2016. Marty has guided the Association through unprecedented change and growth. Under his leadership, the IHSA has experienced impactful expansion (adding multiple sports and activities) and contraction (elimination of membership fees) that have benefitted the membership. He tackled many controversial issues within and outside of the membership, and always did so with tact, dignity, and integrity. As a Board we dealt with many prominent issues last year, including further contact restrictions in football, a revised multiplier waiver system, and the implementation of the success formula in 2015-16. We understand the emotion and passion issues like this evoke, and are proud that we have a system that allows membership to address issues that exist.

I enjoy a truly unique IHSA experience from where I sit. Not only am I a principal at a member high school and a member of the Board of Directors, but I am also the parent of a current high school student-athlete and the husband of an IHSA official. I get to see firsthand the best attributes and life lessons the Association has to offer, along with the challenges that lie ahead. The IHSA is our Association, and I have no doubt that we will overcome those challenges together as a membership in the months and years to come.

Leadership

Executive Director **Marty Hickman** announced that he would retire in January, 2016 after 25 years at the IHSA, including serving as the Executive Director since 2001. Hickman's tenure as Executive Director included unprecedented growth in participation opportunities for students, as the IHSA added State Series in several sports and activities, including Boys Bowling, Competitive Cheerleading, Competitive Dance, Journalism and Boys & Girls Water Polo. In addition, the IHSA became the first state association in the country to offer Bass Fishing in 2011, while also adding programs for Athletes with Disabilities in several sports under Hickman's leadership in 2012. To honor Hickman's service, the Board voted in June to rename the IHSA Foundation golf outing in his honor.



Coming Full Circle

In September, then **Chicago (Robeson) Principal Gerald Morrow**, currently the principal at Chicago (Dunbar), was appointed to the IHSA Board of Directors. Morrow won an IHSA Boys Basketball state title as a student-athlete at Chicago (King) and then later officiated the state tournament. He is the first Chicago Public Schools representative to serve on the Board since 2010.

NFHS Heart of the Arts Award

Chicago (St. Rita) senior **Ethan Gray** was the IHSA's nominee for the NFHS Heart of the Arts Award in 2014-15. He was named one of seven Section winners for the award, which seeks to recognize high school students who excel in the arts while overcoming significant adversity, and then was voted the national winner among that group. Ethan is an outstanding actor and artist at St. Rita, who also makes incredible contributions to the school's music programs. Ethan was home-schooled through eighth grade to aid his immune system in his fight against sickle cell thalassemia, a genetically inherited disease that contributed to Ethan suffering a stroke during his junior year. Ethan was honored by the NFHS at its Summer Meeting in New Orleans in late June. Several of Ethan's classmates and St. Rita staff members made the trip, allowing the St. Rita band to play live as a part of the Summer Meeting's Opening Session under the direction of Cindy Gradek.

The biggest & brightest moments from 2014-15



The IHSA conducted its first-ever **Student Section Showdown** to determine the student-section with the best spirit and sportsmanship in Illinois. The contest, which was divided into small school and large school classes, had over 40 entries in the inaugural year. Schools submitted videos of their student sections in action, as well as reflecting on the role they play in school spirit, and were judged by the IHSA Student Advisory Committee, who spearheaded the contest. Moweaqua (Central A & M) was the Class 1A/2A winner, while Mt. Prospect (Prospect) was voted the Class 3A/4A champion. Prospect's winning section, known as The Underground, not only made an impact in the stands, the group also raised over \$11,000 dollars for charity.



The IHSA Boys' Basketball Tournament marked its **20th year of Playing in Peoria** in 2015, an anniversary that culminated with Chicago Blackhawks anthem singer Jim Cornelison bringing down the house with a rousing rendition prior to the Class 4A title game. Earlier that day, the IHSA Board of Directors voted on the future of the IHSA Boys & Girls Basketball State Final tournaments, ultimately deciding that both tournaments would stay in their current host venues in Peoria and at Illinois State University's Redbird Arena in Normal, respectively.



Downs (Tri-Valley) senior Austin Spencer and head basketball coach Jon Nelson were the IHSA nominees for the NFHS Spirit of Award. Austin discovered that he was one of approximately 50 people in the world living with a rare immune deficiency disease just weeks before the start of his junior year. He spent his entire junior year in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he underwent a bone marrow transplant and recovery. Despite the distance, Coach Nelson's support and friendship played a key role in Austin's recovery. Austin completed his miraculous recovery by returning to Tri-Valley exactly one year from the date of his transplant. He started in the team's season-opening basketball game that night, scoring a game-high 15 points.



The IHSA's second class of **Distinguished Media Service Award winners** included editor/writer Fred Kroner of Champaign-Urbana News-Gazette, writer/editor John Radtke of the Daily Herald in suburban Chicago, and the voice of WRMJ in Aledo, Jim Taylor. Winners were nominated by member schools and voted on by the IHSA Media Advisory Committee, before being recognized at a high school sporting event of their choosing.

- Chicago (DePaul College Prep) **Principal Jim Quaid** completed a term-limit of nine years of service on the IHSA Board of Directors. During Jim's nine years he was also the principal at Oak Park (Fenwick) and Aurora (Marmion).
- O'Fallon kicker **Tucker McCann** set a new IHSA state record during a 16-13 loss to Belleville East when he booted a 60-yard field goal.
- Wilmington junior kicker **Jordan Sarr** stepped onto the field with four seconds remaining in the Class 3A state championship game against Williamsville with the score tied 17-17. Sarr booted a 31-yard field goal as time expired, lifting the Wildcats to their first state title in school history.
- The **Chicago Bears** once again honored the IHSA Football State Champions at a home game at Solider Field.
- Legendary Chicago (Marshall) Girls' Basketball **Coach Dorothy Gaters**, who owns eight IHSA state titles, won her 1000th career game in November, making her the eighth coach in the nation to reach that milestone.
- Wheeling Athletic Director **Stephen May** was a recipient of a Distinguished Service Award from the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA).
- Algonquin (Jacobs) **Lauren Van Vlierbergen**, a cross country and track & field standout, won the national Wendy's High School Heisman award.
- Highland Park senior **Sam Brief** won the Best Student Broadcaster Award in the nation at the inaugural NFHS Network Broadcast Academy event in Atlanta, Georgia. Additionally, 23 IHSA schools were recognized as being among the top student broadcast programs in the country.
- Glenview (Glenbrook South) Athletic Director **Steven Rockrohr** was honored with the NIAAA State Award of Merit.
- LaGrange (Lyons) senior **Stephanie Lin** won her third consecutive IHSA Badminton Individual State Championship.
- Plainfield (Central) senior **Kahmari Montgomery** was the star of the Class 3A Boys Track & Field State Finals, winning the 100m, 200m & 400m races.
- Machesney Park (Harlem) sophomore **Jacob Nimt** made history at the 2015 IHSA Boys Bowling State when he became the first bowler in state final history to bowl two perfect games in one state final tournament. Nimt used the two perfect games to propel himself to a new individual state final championship record pinfall of 3,011.

IHSA staff member **Scott Johnson** received the prestigious NFHS Citation Award for career service.



The NFHS named Minonk (Fieldcrest) Competitive Dance Coach **Tina Fortner** its National Spirit Coach of the Year.



Belleville (East) teacher **Carol Harms** was named the NFHS Outstanding Speech, Debate, Theatre Educator Award for the Midwest Section.



Former IHSA Administrator **Susie Knoblauch**, who left for a position with the NFHS in 2014, was honored by the Illinois Journalism Education Association (IJE) as its Friend of Scholastic Journalism honoree.



The IHSA celebrated 100 years of IHSA Tennis

Chicago (Phillips) became the first CPS school to reach an IHSA Football State Championship game since Chicago (Robeson) in 1982. The Wildcats came up short in the Class 4A game, as Rochester extended its record-setting run with a fifth straight state title.





In May, 2015 the Illinois High School Association introduced its new player safety education initiative **Play Smart. Play Hard.®**

Working collaboratively with its Sports Medicine Advisory Committee (page 17), top medical experts, invested sports medicine organizations, high school coaches, the state legislature and the NFHS, the IHSA has become recognized as a national leader in the area of sports safety. **The Play Smart. Play Hard.®** campaign was initiated to spotlight the many efforts that have been taken throughout the past decade and beyond without fanfare.

Play Hard.® coincided with the IHSA developing the Illinois Advisory Council on Player Safety (page 16) whose purpose is to facilitate transparent dialogue about head injuries and other player safety issues, review the IHSA's current programs, and offer new recommendations to ensure the IHSA remains a leader in student-athlete safety standards and protocols.

Student Safety Changes from 2014-15



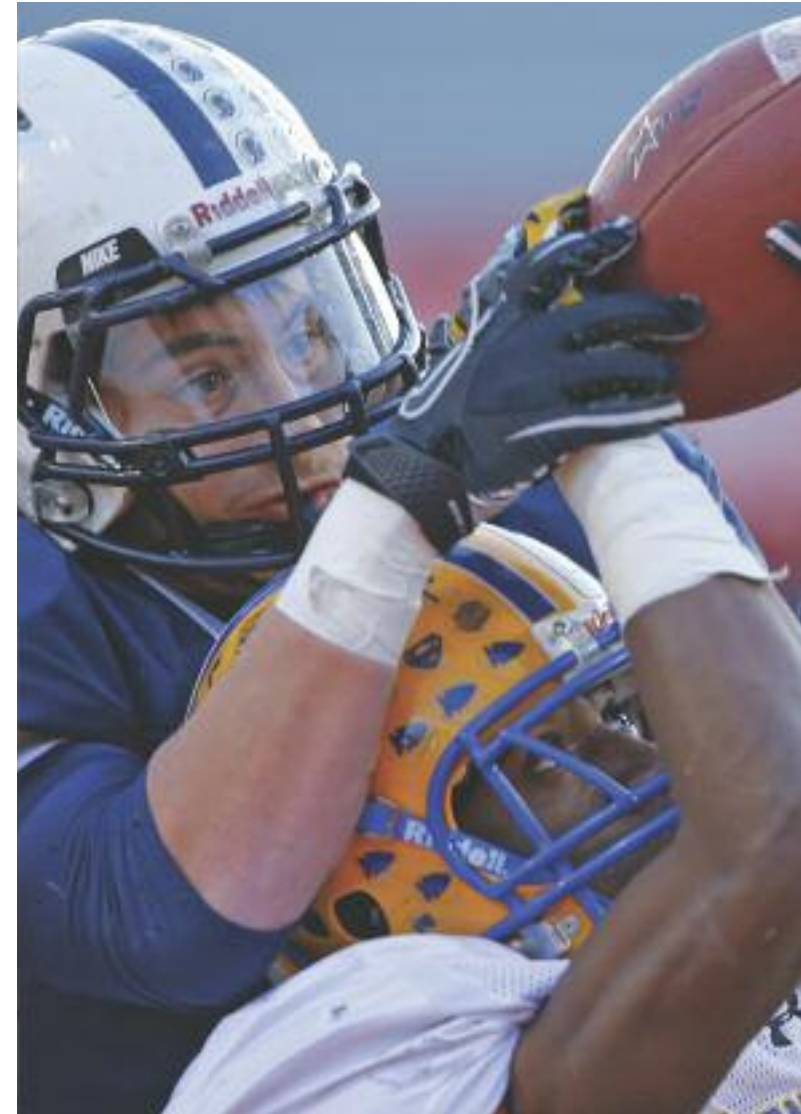
The IHSA worked with the state legislature to develop and mandate all high school coaches in Illinois complete mandatory online concussion training. **Over 30,000 coaches** have now completed the course.



After reviewing the recommendations of the NFHS Concussion Task Force, IHSA Sports Medicine Advisory Committee, and IHSA Football Advisory Committee, the IHSA Board **voted to restrict full contact football in two areas**. The Board limited full live contact to one practice per day during the first two weeks of the season when four total two-a-day practices are allowed. Once the regular-season begins, teams are limited to 90 total minutes of full live contact at practice over the course of three days.



The **IHSA Sports Medicine Advisory Committee** continued to utilize NFHS partner High School Rio, which is the largest and most accurate high school sports injury surveillance database in the country, to help shape its policies. RIO is operated by renowned Dr. Dawn Comstock at the University of Colorado.

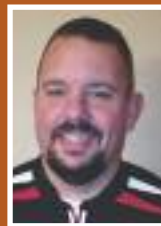

The Board **strengthened the appeal rules** for wrestling weight certification. A final appeal can now only occur if the athlete has not exceeded 1.5% weight loss per week each week from the date of the first certification. The wrestler can drop no more than one weight class from the original test.



The IHSA co-hosted a free **Practice Like Pros football clinic** for high school coaches. The clinic featured current and former collegiate and NFL coaches who provided real-world resources to coaches on how to practice effectively while reducing contact.



IHSA leadership appeared in Springfield in April to help support legislation from Senator Jim Durkin and State Senator Kwame Raoul to expand and strengthen concussion & safety, which includes a “return to learn” classroom component for the first time. The bill was signed as a law in August.

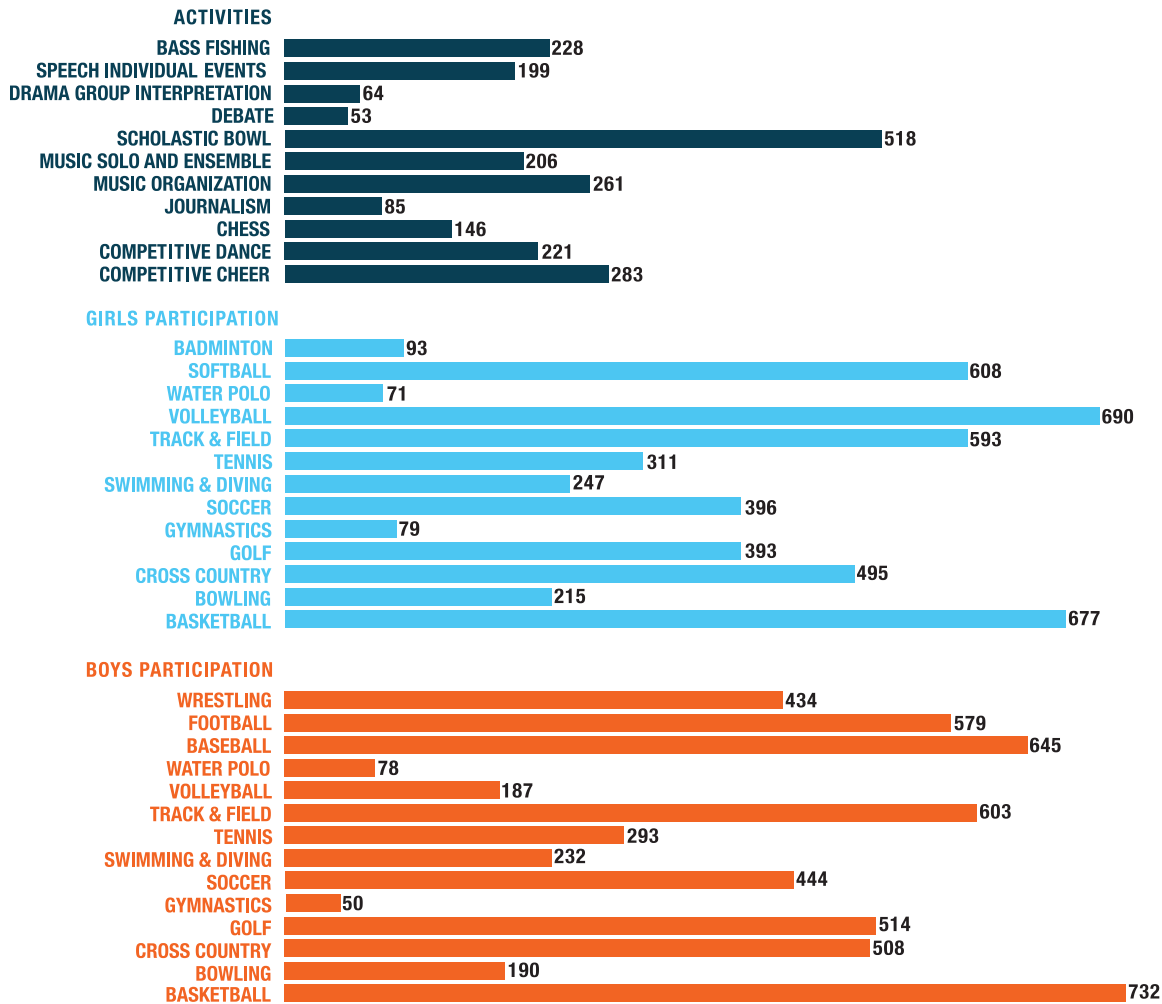

Students who are ruled ineligible for not meeting the IHSA by-laws voted into place by member schools often make headlines, but ultimately, an incredibly small percentage of students require a ruling and even fewer are declared ineligible to play in contests (all students remain eligible to practice & be a part of a team).

The graph below represents the 340,972 students who participated in IHSA sports in 2014-15. **Teal** represents students who participated with no ruling necessary, **Cyan** represents the 1,830 students who required rulings, and **Orange** is the 0.158% percent (542) who were ineligible per the by-laws.

Creating Opportunities

The IHSA exists to create opportunities for high school students. The IHSA member schools, Board of Directors and IHSA staff work together to increase opportunities in a variety of ways. Some news and notes from 2014-15:



According to the annual NFHS Participation Survey, **Illinois ranked fourth in the nation in sports participation** a year ago with 340,972 high school student-athletes participating in athletics. Illinois ranked fourth in both male (199,595) and female (141,377) participation as well, trailing Texas, California, and New York.



In January, the IHSA membership voted to change the by-law for international student participation beginning in 2015-16. **International students will have the opportunity** for eligibility as long as they enter through a program that is approved by the IHSA Board after a vetting process. Previously, international students only had eligibility if they came through CSIET foreign exchange programs.



The IHSA and Special Olympics teamed up to conduct a unified bass fishing tournament in conjunction with the IHSA Bass Fishing State Finals. Three high schools (Huntley, Niles Notre Dame, Pontiac) participated in the event.



Lacrosse remains an emerging IHSA sport. The IHSA Board has authorized the start of a state tournament upon 65 schools entering the boys' tournament and 40 entering the girls' tourney.

The Value of IHSA Membership

The amount of money the IHSA returned to member schools via host guarantees, ticket revenue & reimbursements during the 2014-15 school year.

Unlike many state high school associations, the **IHSA does not charge** member schools initial or annual dues to be a member, nor does it charge schools entry fees to compete in State Series.

The **IHSA provides** NFHS Rulebooks to member schools at no cost.

The IHSA is one of the few state high school associations in the country to offer activities, in addition to sports. **We believe in the value of participation** and want every student to have a chance to represent their school.

Because of that belief, the IHSA continues to underwrite multiple state tournaments that do not produce revenue. In general, around eight IHSA sport tournaments produce the revenue that helps fund the Association's 37 sports and activities.

The **IHSA provides** catastrophic medical insurance for all student-athletes competing in postseason contests.

The IHSA hosts a statewide biannual Student Leadership Conference that is **free for students** to attend.

The **IHSA offers** free State Series and State Final attendance for all activities and for multiple sports.

For the sports that do require tickets, the average IHSA State Series ticket cost is \$4.90 and the average State Final ticket is \$8.50, making high school sports a **great value for students and families**.

The IHSA has been **progressive and innovative** in its promotion of the positive ideals of participation to its schools. That includes introducing Add A. Tude, the nation's first sportsmanship mascot in 1997.

The **IHSA promotes and highlights** the positive actions by our schools, student-athletes, coaches and fans through its original content page IHSA State, on Social Media, and through various award programs.

The IHSA Foundation & All-State Academic team programs have awarded **over \$541,000 in scholarship money** since 1994.

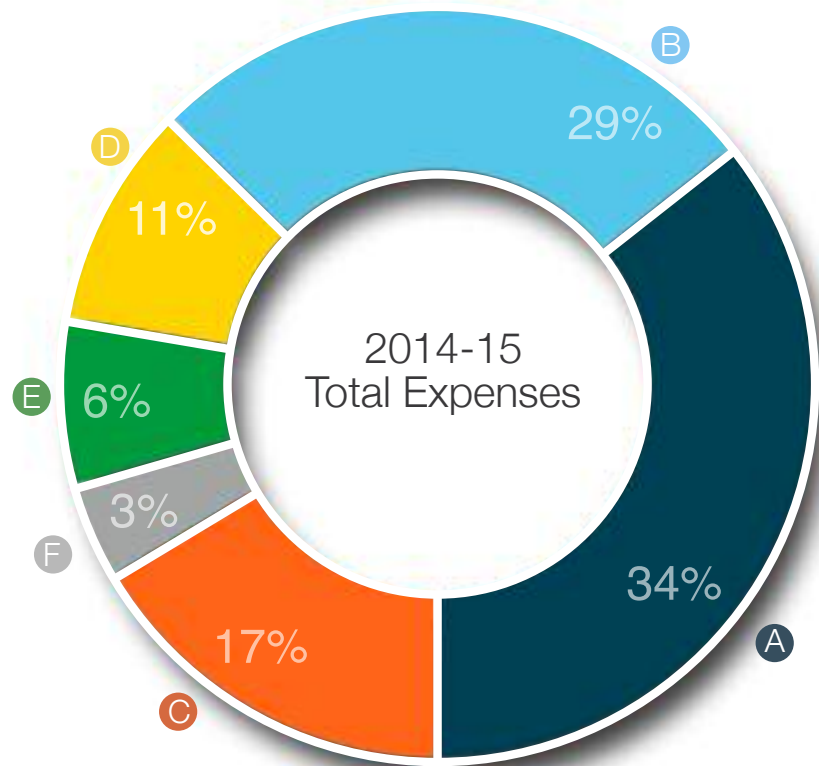

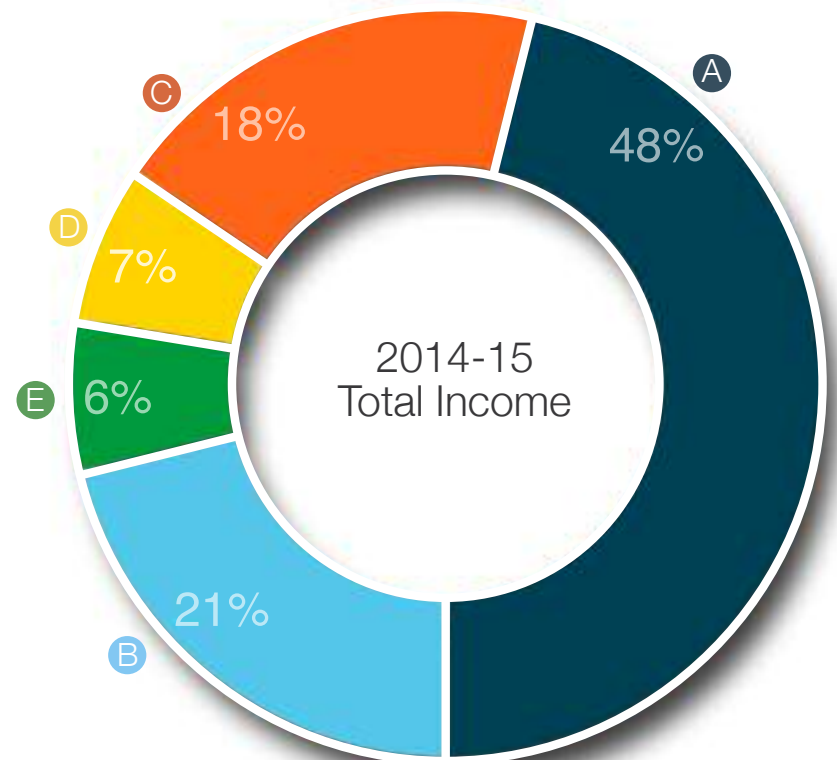


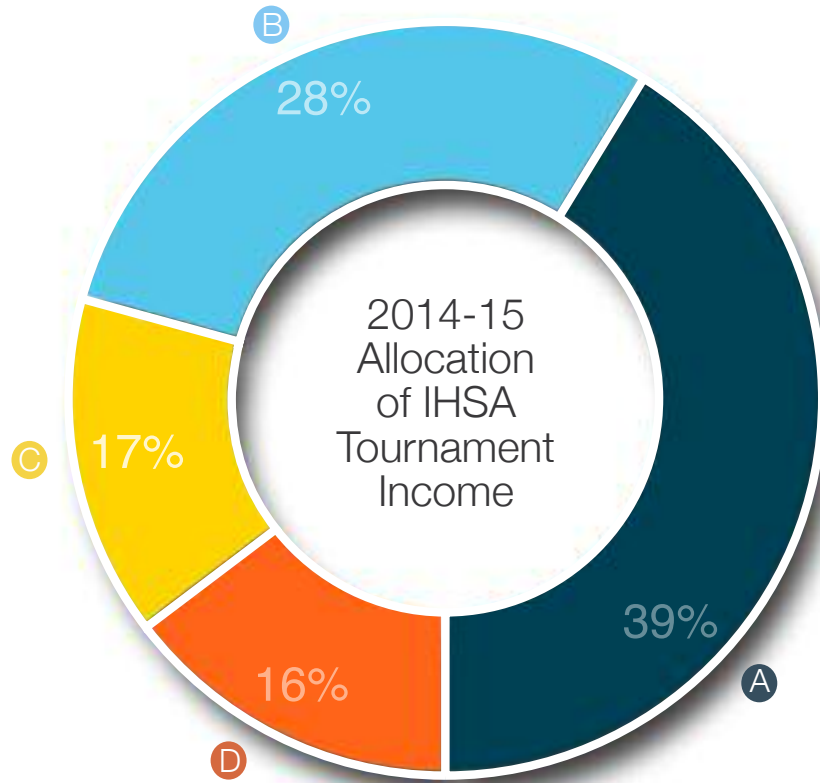

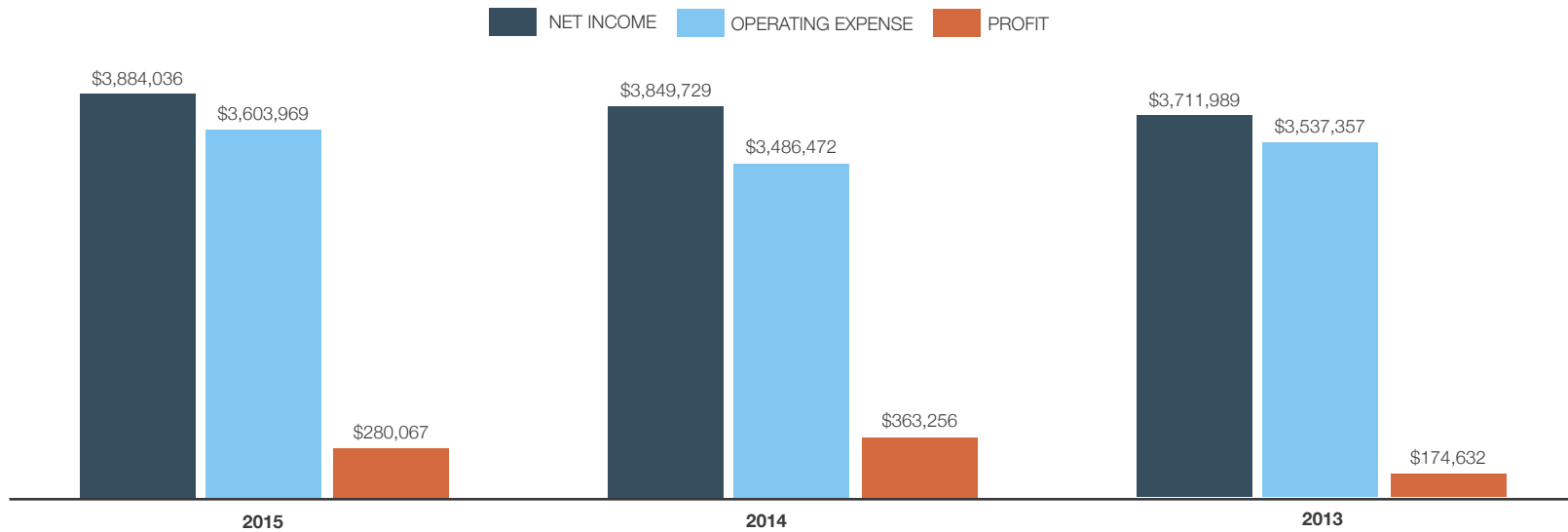


2014-15 ALLOCATION OF IHSA TOURNAMENT INCOME

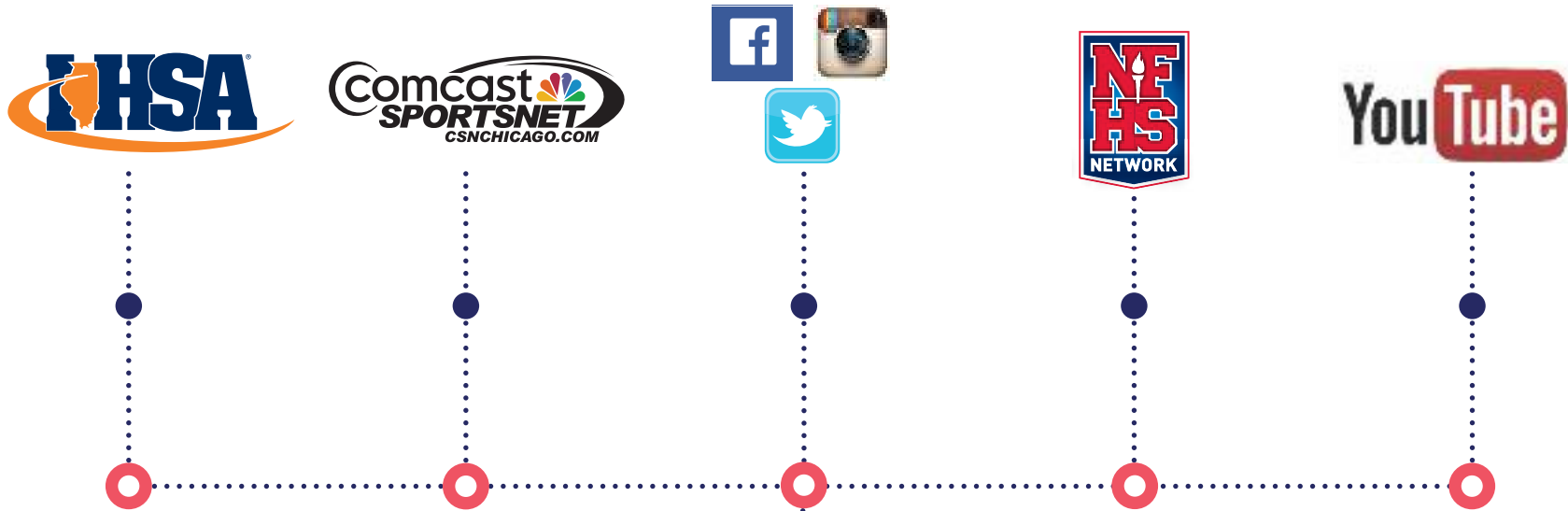

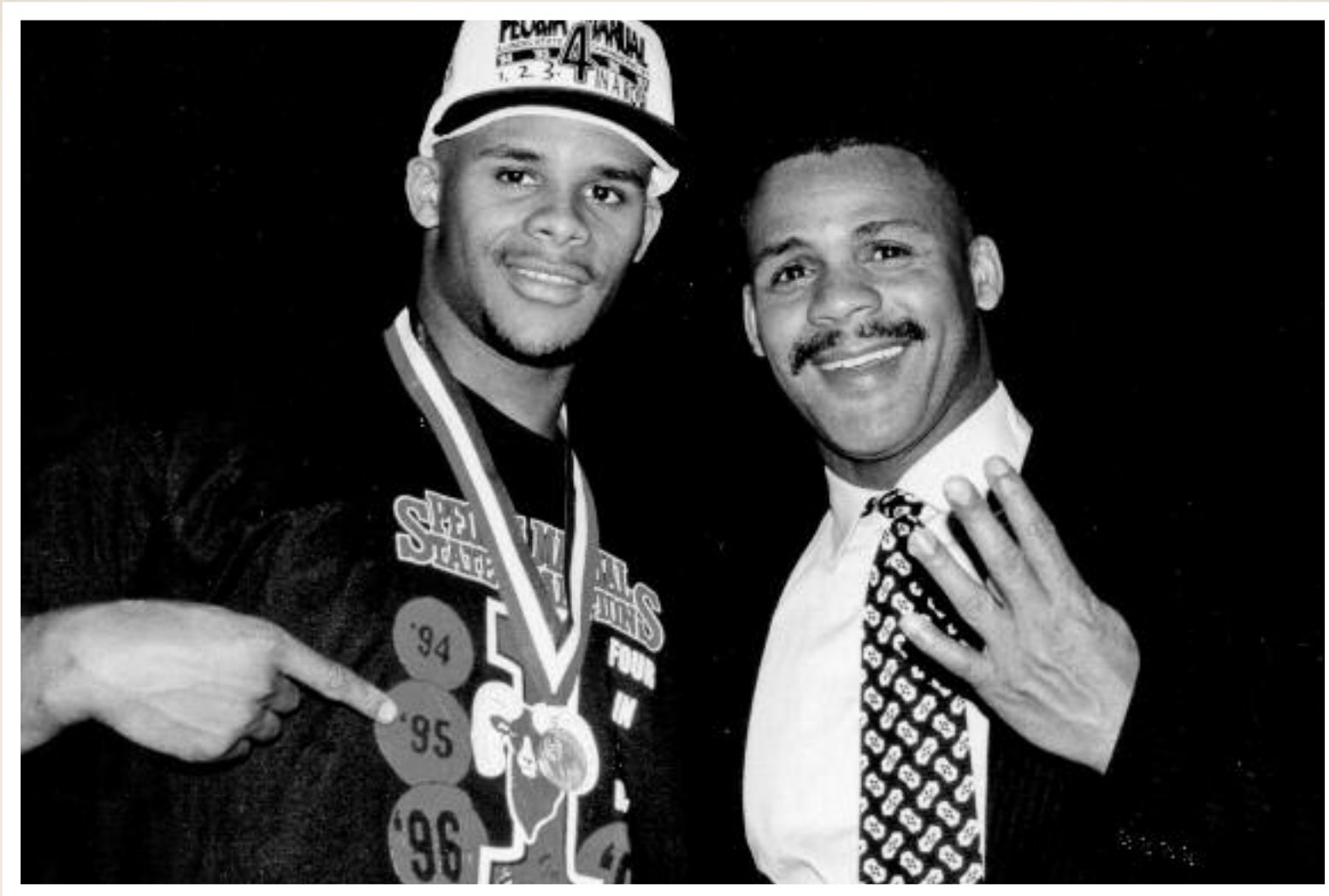
