

SPORT FISHING LICENSE

ILLINOIS RESIDENTS:

A resident sport fishing license may be obtained by anyone who has been a resident of Illinois 30 days prior to purchase. Anglers under 16 years of age, and persons declared legally disabled or blind, may fish without a license. Owners or tenants (if they reside on the land) may fish in waters on or flowing over their lands without a license. This exemption does not apply to club and organizational lakes or lake developments.

Persons on active duty in the Armed Forces are considered residents. A person on active duty in the Armed Forces, who entered the service from Illinois and is an Illinois resident, may fish without a license while on leave.

** Beginning with the 2012 license year, halfpriced sportfishing and sportsman's licenses will be available to resident veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces after returning from service abroad, or mobilization by the President of the United States. Veterans must provide verification of their service to the Department at one of the five regional offices. The Department shall establish what constitutes suitable verification of service for the purpose of issuing fishing licenses to resident veterans at a reduced fee.

NON-RESIDENTS:

Non-residents of Illinois may purchase sport fishing licenses to fish waters of the state. Non-resident anglers under 16 years of age may fish without a license. All other non-resident anglers must purchase sport fishing licenses before fishing in Illinois (except in licensed fee fishing areas or on boundary rivers).

Resident or non-resident anglers who fish at fee fishing areas licensed by the Department of Natural Resources are not required to have a license.

Non-residents holding licenses from states bordering Illinois are not required to have an Illinois license to fish on the Illinois side of rivers adjoining the licensing state (see page 66 BOUNDARY RIVERS).

Anglers should have their license in possession at all times while fishing. Licenses expire on March 31 each year.

LOST, STOLEN, DESTROYED LICENSE REPLACEMENT:

- Licenses purchased via the Internet can be reprinted at no charge by visiting www.dnr.illinois. gov/LPR. Vendor transactions will incur a fee.
- Replacement licenses, permits and stamps are available for \$3 from Regional offices (except Region 2), the Chicago office and the Springfield Public Service area (see inside front cover map).
- Vendors can issue replacement licenses with a DNR Direct terminal. There is a \$3 replacement fee per item plus a small transaction fee.

DISABLED OR BLIND PERSONS:

In order for disabled or blind persons who are Illinois residents to fish without a license, the person must be able to show proof of disability in the form of one of the following:

- 1. A State disabled person I.D. card (available from the Secretary of State through the drivers license examining station) showing a Class 2 or Class 2A disability. Applies to Illinois residents only.
- 2. Veterans disability card (available from the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs Office) Veterans who are at least 10% disabled with service-related disabilities or in receipt of total disability pensions may fish with sport fishing devices during those periods of the year it is lawful to do so without being required to have a license, on the condition that their respective disabilities do not prevent them from fishing in a manner which is safe to themselves and others. Applies to both Illinois residents and non-residents.

SUMMARY OF FISHING REGULATIONS

ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

The fisheries of Illinois are administered to assure conservation and enhancement of the fishery resource and the equity of the fishing public, while providing for maximum enjoyment. Statutes provide the framework by which fishing opportunities are administered. These opportunities, however, are sometimes subject to a variety of regulations, depending on local site conditions and situations peculiar to a particular fishery. These detailed regulations are set forth in administrative rules. Such rules are enforced in the same manner as are provisions of the statutes, and are subject to the same penalties.

AQUATIC LIFE

Aquatic life is statutorily defined as all fish, reptiles, amphibians, crayfish and mussels.

BAIT FISHING

A sport fishing license permits the use of legal-sized cast nets, shad scoops, minnow traps and minnow seines to obtain shad, alewife, minnows and crayfish to use as bait, provided they are not sold or are not identified as threatened or endangered aquatic life. All cast nets shall be not larger than 8 feet in diameter or of a mesh size not larger than 3/8 inch bar measurement. All shad scoops shall be not larger than 30 inches in diameter or of a mesh size not larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement or longer than 4 feet in length. Minnow seines shall not be longer than 20 feet, deeper than 6 feet or contain mesh size larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement. Minnow

traps shall not be longer than 36 inches, nor wider than 24 inches, nor use mesh larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement.

Minnows and crayfish may be collected with traps of metal screen or hardware cloth, plastic, or nylon mesh or netting. Such traps may not be more than 24 inches in width or diameter or more than 36 inches in length nor use a mesh of more than 1/2 inch bar measurement. Each entrance aperture may not exceed 1.5 inches in diameter. If unattended, such devices must be tagged with the name and mailing address of the person operating the device. Minnows and crayfish collected in such devices may only be taken for personal use and may not be sold or bartered.

Collected live bait fish may not be transported between water bodies.

BLUEGILL AS BAIT

There is nothing in the Illinois Fish Code which prohibits the use of legally taken bluegill or sunfish as bait for another species of fish, but bluegill/sunfish can only be used at the body of water from which they were taken. The bluegill/ sunfish must have been taken by a properly licensed sport fisherman using legal sportfishing devices. You must also observe all size and creel limits both where the bluegill/ sunfish were taken and where they are being used as bait. Also, it is illegal to cut up or dress or be in possession of cut up or dressed fish on any body of water where there is a size limit for that particular species of fish.

BOW AND ARROW FISHING / SPEARING

Legal Methods of Taking

Carp, buffalo, suckers, gar, shad, drum, and bowfin may be taken by means of a pitchfork, underwater spear gun, bow and arrow or bow and arrow device, spear, or gig. Each person taking fish by these means shall possess a valid sport fishing license. Fish taken by these means shall not be sold or bartered. No other fish may be taken in this State by these means. It is unlawful to discharge any bow and arrow device along, upon, across or from any public right-of-way or highway in this Sate.

Species of Fish and Catch Limit
Only fish species listed on page 57 may be taken
by bowfishing and other legal methods as per
creel limits identified for each.

CLEANING FISH ON WATERS

No fish entrails or carcass may be disposed of into the waters of Illinois after cleaning. No fish species may be dressed (filleted or head and tail removed) on any waters to which length limits are applicable.

COMMERCIAL FISH

The minimum size limit on fish taken commercially or by commercial fishermen for market (except

New regulations for the 2013-2015 fishing season are identified by gray shading. Anglers should refer to all applicable regulations prior to fishing any body of water. in the Ohio River) is 15 inches in total length for: channel catfish, flathead catfish, blue catfish and white catfish. There is no size limit on carp, drum, bullhead, buffalo, shovelnose sturgeon, paddle-fish, sucker, gar (except alligator gar), bowfin, eel, yellow perch, chub, mooneye, goldeye, carpsucker and smelt. All other species may not be taken commercially, but if caught incidentally must be returned immediately to waters where taken.

COMMERCIAL LICENSES

A commercial fishing license is required for any person who uses a commercial device to take fish or minnows. A resident commercial fishing license can be issued only to persons who have resided in Illinois for at least a year. The commercial fishing license expires March 31 annually. In addition, the holder of this license must obtain a license for each commercial device fished.

A commercial musseling license is required for any person who commercially harvests mussels. Any person assisting a license commercial musselor in taking mussels must have a commercial musseling license.

CRAYFISH

It is a violation of state law to import, possess, sell or use as bait live rusty crayfish and red swamp crayfish within the State of Illinois. The rusty crayfish may be distinguished by a dark rusty spot on both sides of the carapace and a rusty-red band followed by a dark stripe on the large pincers (claws). The red swamp crayfish may be distinguished by its red coloration, long thin pincers (claws) and two curving lines that touch on the top of its back. Both species destroys aquatic vegetation and eats the eggs of various fishes, which negatively affects fish reproduction.

Crayfish, except endangered or threatened species, may be taken for bait, using legal sized cast nets, shad scoops, and minnow seines, provided that they are not sold or bartered. All cast nets shall not be larger than 8 feet in diameter or of a mesh size not larger than 3/8 inch bar measurement. All shad scoops shall not be larger than 30 inches in diameter or of a mesh size not larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement or longer than 4 feet in length. Minnow seines shall not be longer than 20 feet, deeper than 6 feet or contain mesh size larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement.


Crayfish may be collected with traps of metal screen or hardware cloth, plastic, or nylon mesh or netting. Such traps may not be more than 24 inches in width or diameter or more than 36 inches in length nor use a mesh of more than 1/2 inch bar measurement. Each entrance aperture may not exceed 1 1/2 inches in diameter. If unattended, such devices must be tagged with the name and mailing address of the person operating the device. Crayfish collected in such devices may only be taken for personal use and may not be sold or bartered.

Collected live crayfish may not be transported between water bodies.

CULLING

It is illegal to replace a smaller fish held in possession with a larger fish unless: the smaller fish is counted toward the daily limit or released within the confines of a bona-fide catch-and-release fishing tournament which requires the participants to have a boat live well with a pump constantly adding fresh or recirculating water.

HOW TO MEASURE FISH



Use a flat board, close the mouth, and compress the tail.

DAILY CREEL AND SIZE LIMITS (STATEWIDE)

- Length is measured from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail with the fish laid flat on a ruler, with the mouth of the fish closed and the tail lobes pressed together.
- 2. No fish species may be dressed (filleted or head and tail removed) on any waters to which length limits are applicable. Regardless of where taken, no fish less than the specified minimum length or more than the daily creel shall be possessed while taking from, or on the waters to which length limits and/or daily creel limits apply.
- 3. Statewide limits by type of fish:
- (A) Channel Catfish

There are no daily creel or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.

(B) Largemouth Bass, Smallmouth Bass, Spotted Bass

Daily creel limit is 6 bass, either singly or in the aggregate except as specified under Site Specific Regulations. In streams and rivers (excluding the mainstem of the Mississippi, Ohio, and Wabash Rivers) the daily creel can contain no more than 3 smallmouth bass. In streams and tributaries statewide except for the Mississippi, Ohio, Wabash, and Illinois Rivers, all smallmouth bass must be immediately released between April 1 and June 15. There is no statewide size limit.

- (C) Muskellunge, Northern Pike and their Hybrids 1. All pure muskellunge and muskellunge hybrids (tiger muskie) taken must be 36 inches in total length or longer, except in those waters listed in the Site Specific Regulations where pure muskellunge taken must be 48 inches in total length or longer. 2. No more than 1 muskellunge or muskellunge hybrid (tiger muskie), either singly or in the aggregate, may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations. 3. All northern pike taken must be 24 inches in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River and Ohio River where there is no length limit.
 - 4. No more than 3 northern pike may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
- (D) Crappie (White, Black or Hybrid Crappie) There are no creel or length limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
- (E) Bluegill and Redear Sunfish There are no creel or length limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
- (F) Striped Bass (Ocean Rockfish), White Bass and Hybrids

There are no daily creel limits or minimum size limits for striped bass (ocean rockfish), white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids which are less than 17 inches in total length, except in


those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations. For those fish 17 inches in total length or longer, the daily limit is 3 fish, either singly or in the aggregate except on the Mississippi River bordering Missouri where there is a 30 fish daily creel limit. In the Mississippi River between Illinois and lowa, there is a 25 fish daily creel on striped bass, white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids, either singly or in the aggregate.

(G) Trout and Salmon

Statewide, the daily creel limit is 5 trout or salmon, either singly or in the aggregate. In Lake Michigan, the daily creel limit is also 5 fish (singly or collectively); no more than 5 fish of any one species (except for lake trout where 2 fish is the daily creel limit; for all species the minimum length limit is 10 inches.

(H) Walleye, Sauger, and their Hybrids Daily creel limit is 6 walleye, sauger, or their hybrids either singly or in the aggregate, except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations. All walleye, sauger, or their hybrid taken must be 14 inches in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River, Ohio River, Wabash River, or as specified under Site Specific Regulations.

For purposes of length or creel limit regulations, anglers must check the lower portion of the tail fin. WALLEYE have a white tip on the lower tail fin. SAUGER OR HYBRID SAUGER/WALLEYE do not have a white tip on the lower tail fin.



(I) Injurious Species: Snakeheads, Walking Catfish, Zebra Mussels, River Ruffe, Black Carp, Gobies (Round, Tubenose), Rusty Crayfish, Rudd, Bighead Carp, Silver Carp.

There are no catch or size limits. Possession of live specimens, progeny thereof, viable egg, or gametes is prohibited. For rusty crayfish, possession of living specimens is prohibited except the holders of an approved aquaculture permit with a letter of authorization to import/possess this species.

Protecting Our Natural Resources

To prevent the introduction and spread of aquatic nuisance species, Illinois has implemented an Injurious Species regulation (Administrative Code 805). Of special note to anglers, this rule **prohibits the possession** of species deemed to be harmful to our lakes and rivers, and to the fish and wildlife that inhabit them. These harmful species include:

Bighead Carp Black Carp Eurasian Ruffe Rudd Round Goby Rusty Crayfish Silver Carp Snakeheads Tubenose Goby Walking Catfish

These injuries fish species may not be released back into any Illinois waters!

DAILY FEE FISHING AREA

A sport fishing license and "Inland Trout Stamp" are not required to fish in a Department of Natural Resources licensed daily fee fishing area.

DIP NETS

A sport fishing license allows the holder to take smelt in Lake Michigan with a dip net not exceeding 12 feet in diameter and having a mesh size not less than 1 inch diagonal stretch. In other waters carp, carpsucker, buffalo and gizzard shad may be taken with a dip net up to 15 feet in diameter and with a mesh size no less than 1 1/2 inches bar measure. Such equipment may not be used within 100 feet of a dam or to take game fish.

ENDANGERED AND THREATENED SPECIES OF AQUATIC LIFE

There are more than 80 species of aquatic life in Illinois currently on the State Endan-gered and Threatened Species (E&T) List which may not be taken for any purpose. For more information or to obtain a listing of these species of aquatic life, please go to www.dnr.state.il.us/espb/ and click on the link List of Endangered Species in Illinois.

The one species of fish on the E&T list most likely taken by sport fishing is the lake sturgeon. Accidental catches of lake sturgeon should be released immediately.

FISH DISPOSAL - FISH ABANDONMENT

It is unlawful for any person at any time to take or possess any fish in Illinois waters by sportfishing methods and then intentionally leave or abandon such fish or portions thereof resulting in wanton or needless waste. It is also unlawful for any person to intentionally allow the fish or a portion thereof to be wantonly or needlessly wasted or to fail to dispose thereof in a reasonable and sanitary manner. No disposal of fish or fish portions shall be allowed on State owned or leased properties except at designated fish cleaning stations.

FISH PRESERVES

All waters under state jurisdiction are statutorily fish preserves, open only to sport fishing. However, certain waters are open to commercial fishing by administrative rule. Contact the Department of Natural Resources for more information.

FISHING GUIDES

Fishing guides are required to possess a passenger for hire license.

FREE FISHING DAYS

During the period of June 7, 8, 9, and 10, 2013 and June 6, 7, 8, and 9, 2014, it shall be legal for any person to fish in waters wholly or in part within the jurisdiction of the State, including the Illinois portion of Lake Michigan, without possessing a sport fishing license, inland trout stamp, or salmon stamp.



FREE GROUP FISHING PERMITS

The Illinois DNR may issue at no cost, the following two types of group fishing permits: (1) for

hospital patients, nursing home residents, or handicapped people in connection with supervised fishing for therapy; and (2) for group events that have as their primary purpose the promotion of sport fishing in Illinois and are sponsored by church groups, 4-H, Scouts, IDNR, nursing homes, etc. For more information or an application form write to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

FROGS (Bullfrogs Only)

Methods of Taking and Capture
A sport fishing license is required to take bullfrogs.
Bullfrogs may be by hook and line, gig, pitchfork, spear, bow and arrow, hand, or landing net.

No person shall take bullfrogs or any other reptile or amphibian by commercial fishing devices, including, hoop nets, traps or seines or by the use of firearms, air guns or gas guns.

All other species of unprotected reptiles and amphibians (excluding common snapping turtles and bullfrogs) may only be taken by hand. This shall not restrict the use of legally taken reptiles or amphibians as bait by anglers.

Any captured reptiles or amphibians which are not to be retained in the possession of the captor shall be immediately released at the site of capture, unless taken with a lethal method (such as bow and arrow, gig, spear, pitchfork) which does not permit "release with no harm". All such taken common snapping turtles and bullfrogs must be kept and counted in the daily catch creel or bag. No culling of such taken species is permitted.

No person shall take or possess any species of reptile or amphibian listed as endangered or threatened in Illinois (17 III. Adm. Code 1010 except as provided by 17 III. Adm. Code 1070).

Season

Bullfrogs may be taken only between June 15 and August 31, both dates inclusive.

Daily Catch and Possession Limits
The daily catch limit for bullfrogs is 8 with a possession limit of 16.

For indigenous amphibian and reptile taxa, which may only be taken by hand, (excluding common snapping turtles and bullfrogs) the possession limit is 8 collectively with no more than 4 per taxa.

ICE FISHING

A sport fishing license is required for ice fishing. The ice angler may use a maximum of three poles or tip-ups with no more than two hooks on each line. Sites with a two pole and line fishing only restriction may use a maximum of two poles or tip-ups. Holes cut in the ice are limited to 12-inch diameter or less. Shelter structures are limited to portable construction of metal or wood framework, covered with canvas, paper, plastic material or similar fabric. Each shelter shall have the name and address of the owner attached, and after March 1 the shelter must be removed when not in use, and not left unattended at any time. All poles and tip-ups shall be constantly attended and kept under observation by the angler.

ILLEGAL DEVICES

Use of the following devices in the taking of aquatic life is prohibited: electricity or electrical devices; lime; acid; medical, chemical or mechanical compounds; dope; drugs; fishberry; dynamite; nitroglycerine or other explosive; snare; treated grain; firearms; air gun; gas gun; wire basket; wire seine; wire net; wire trotline or limb lines of any kind.

INLAND TROUT STAMP - ALL WATERS (except Lake Michigan)

Anglers are required to purchase an "Inland Trout Stamp" prior to taking of trout from all waters except Lake Michigan. Fees are (including agent's fees):

Resident and Non-resident; annual \$6	3.50
Resident; 65 years old and over \$6	3.50

Resident and non-resident	
under 16 years of age	NONE
Resident: disabled, blind	NONE

The 24-hour license does not include trout fishing privileges.

MINNOWS

A minnow is statutorily defined as any fish in the minnow family (Cyprinidae) except carp and goldfish.

Persons possessing a valid sport fishing license may take minnows with cast nets (not larger than 8 feet in diameter and having a mesh size not larger than 3/8 inch bar measurement), shad scoops (not larger than 30 inches in diameter or longer than 4 feet in length and having a bar mesh size not larger than 1/2 inch), or a minnow seine (no longer than 20 feet in length, deeper than 6 feet or having a mesh size larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement), or a trap not more than 36 inches in length, 24 inches in width, and with mesh no larger than 1/2 inch bar measurement.

MUSSELS

Only persons possessing a valid commercial musselor license may take mussels from designated waters. The possession of a sport fishing license does not entitle any persons to take and/or possess mussels.

POLLUTION

The Department of Natural Resources cooperates with the Environmental Protection Agency in making pollution investigations. Anglers are often the first to observe water pollution, and their assistance is invited in reporting these instances to District and Regional Fisheries Biologists, to a Conservation Police Officer or to the Division of Fisheries in Springfield.

It is unlawful for waste or sewage to be discharged into waters so as to kill aquatic life. It is also unlawful to abandon or deposit wire, cans, bottles, glass, paper, trash, rubbish, cardboard, wood cartons, boxes, trees, brush or other insoluble materials into the water or on the ice, or at any place on the bank where such debris is liable to be washed into the water. Strict penalties are provided for violation of this section of the statute.

PROPERTY

Consideration for others is a philosophy of the sportsman. Consent of the landowner or occupant of the premises shall be obtained before fishing or attempting to take aquatic life on another's property or within waters other than public waters of the state. Care should be taken not to cause damage to the property.

SALE OF AQUATIC LIFE

No fish, amphibians, reptiles, crayfish, or parts thereof (including eggs or resulting offspring) taken by sport fishing license methods (including snagging) may be bought, sold or bartered.

SALMON STAMP - LAKE MICHIGAN

Anglers are required to purchase a "Lake Michigan Salmon Stamp" prior to taking of

salmon and trout from Lake Michigan. Fees are (including agent's fee):

Resident and non-resident; annual \$6.50
Resident; 65 years old and over \$6.50
Resident and non-resident
under 16 years of age NONE
Resident; disabled, blind NONE

The 24-hour license does not include salmonid fishing privileges in Lake Michigan.

SEASONS

Sport fishing is open year-round (except as noted in the Site Specific Regulations section and for frog season).

SMELT

The sport fishing season for smelt is from March 1 through April 30 (check local seasonal regulations for smelt fishing from Chicago Park District properties). A sport fishing license entitles the angler to také smelt. Waters of Lake Michigan comprise Illinois' smelt fishery. Smelt may be taken with a seine or gill net not more than 12 feet long, 6 feet deep and with mesh size not more than 1 inch diagonal stretch, or by dip net not more than 12 feet in diameter with mesh size not less than 1 inch diagonal stretch. Trolley or power lines may also be used by sport fishermen in taking smelt (see Trot and Trolley Line section). No person shall operate more than one smelt net device at any one time. All fish taken other than smelt must be released immediately.

SNAGGING

Anglers are permitted only one pole and line device to which can be attached no more than two hooks. On the Mississippi River betwen Illinois and Iowa, the maximum treble hook size is 5/0; gaffs may not be used to land paddlefish.

Species of Fish and Snagging Catch Limit

- (1) Only the following species of fish (excluding endangered and threatened species) and catch limit may be taken by snagging:
- Asian Carp (no live possession) no catch limit,
- Carp no catch limit,
- Buffalo no catch limit,
- Freshwater Drum no catch limit,
- Salmon (coho & chinook only) 5 daily, of which not more than 3 may be of the same fish species,
- Paddlefish 2 per day, the maximum length limit for paddlefish taken from the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa is 33" eye-fork length (EFL) (all paddlefish greater than or equal to 33" EFL must be immediately released back to the Mississippi River).
- Bowfin no catch limit,
- Gizzard shad no catch limit,
- Carpsuckers no catch limit,
- Longnose gar no catch limit,
- Shortnose gar no catch limit, and Suckers no catch limit.
- (2) No sorting of snagged salmon and paddlefish is permitted, except for paddlefish taken from the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri where sorting is permitted. Every salmon 10 inches in total length or longer and paddlefish snagged must be taken into immediate possession and included in the daily catch limit. Once the daily limit of salmon or paddlefish has been reached, snagging must cease.

Waters Open to Snagging and Snagging Season

(1) Snagging for fish is permitted from September 15 through December 15 and from March 15

through May 15 within a 300 yard downstream limit below all locks and dams of the Illinois River, except for the area below the Peoria Lock and Dam where snagging is permitted year round.

- (2) Snagging for fish is permitted from September 15 through December 15 and from March 15 through May 15 within a 300 yard downstream limit below all locks and dams of the Mississippi River between Illinois and the Missouri, except for the Chain of Rocks low water dam at Chouteau Island – Madison County, also known as Dam 27 at the Chain of Rocks – Madison County where no snagging is permitted. Snagging is permitted from 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset daily, March 1 through April 15 within a 500 yard downstream limit below locks and dams on the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa.
- (3) Snagging for fish is permitted year-round within a 100 yard limit upstream or downstream of the dam at Horseshoe Lake in Alexander County.
- (4) Snagging for chinook and coho salmon only is permitted from the following Lake Michigan shoreline areas from October 1 through December 31; however, no snagging is allowed at any time within 200 feet of a moored watercraft or as posted:
- Lincoln Park Lagoon from the Fullerton Avenue Bridge to the southern end of the Lagoon,
- Waukegan Harbor (in North Harbor basin only),
- Winnetka Power Plant discharge area,
- Jackson Harbor (Inner and Outer Harbors)

Disposition of Snagged Salmon and Paddlefish All snagged salmon and paddlefish must be removed from the area from which they are taken and disposed of properly, in accordance with Article 5, Section 5-5 of the Fish and Aquatic Life Code.

SPORTFISH

Principal sport fish are the muskellunge, tiger muskie, northern pike, walleye, sauger, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, spotted bass, warmouth, striped bass, hybrid striped bass, white bass, yellow bass, sunfish bluegill, crappie, trout and salmon. These may be taken only with sport fishing devices by anglers having sport fishing licenses. Other species such as paddlefish, catfish, yellow perch, freshwater drum and carp are considered both sport and commercial fish, and the means of taking and purposes for which they are taken prescribe the type of license required. Still other species are considered commercial fish, though when taken on sport fishing devices an angler must have a sport fishing license. A fourth category is endangered and threatened aquatic life. (See Endangered and Threatened Aquatic Life).

SPORTFISHING LICENSE

A sport fishing license entitles an angler to take fish, crayfish, turtles or bullfrogs within limits denoted in the Statewide Creel and Size Limits Table, except for endangered and threatened aquatic life. It is unlawful to sell any aquatic life, or parts thereof, taken by a sport fishing license. Aquatic life may be taken by hand or other legal devices permitted by the sport fishing license which includes: pole and line, bank pole and line, dip net throw line, trot line, buoyed device (jug fishing), or other legal devices not exceeding 50 hooks in total (except as noted under "Ice Fishing" section). Also permitted are legal-sized cast nets, shad scoops and minnow seines for bait fishing. Smelt may be taken in Lake Michigan with legal size dip nets, gill nets and seines. Two untagged sport fishing devices are allowed; each device in excess of two must be



tagged with the angler's name and address. If attached to a tree, the device must be attached only to the main trunk below the water line. All unattended devices must be marked with the angler's name and address.

Special fishing regulations at certain water areas prohibit the use of some devices or numbers of devices; please check the Site Specific Regulations which are contained in this document and are posted at various locations at the sites (boat ramps and site offices) where applicable.

STOCKING

Fish may be released into the waters from which they were taken, but permission from the Department of Natural Resources must be secured before releasing fish in other waters, except for private water owners. An owner of a body of water may release fish into waters wholly upon his or her property that are indigenous to the State of Illinois. It is illegal to import or possess live diploid grass carp, silver carp, bighead carp or hybrid grass carp. A Restricted Species Transportation Permit must be secured from the Department of Natural Resources before importing or stocking triploid grass carp.

TAGGED FISH

Fisheries biologists attach tags to many fish for research purposes. Please report all tags found. If the fish is kept, return the tag to the address printed on the tag or the local fisheries office in your area. If a tagged fish is released, the tag should be reported but left in the fish in good condition. Information regarding the type of fish caught, the length and the weight of the fish and the tag number, if present, should also be reported.

Anglers are strongly advised not to tag fish caught on state and/or public waters.

In addition to tags, many trout and salmon stocked into Lake Michigan are marked by clipping off one or two lines. Anglers catching any trout or salmon with only the adipose fin removed are asked to save the head which contains important information. The adipose fin is the small, fleshy fin found on the backs of trout and salmon between the dorsal fin and the tail. Please record the length and weight of the fish as well as the date and location where caught.

TOURNAMENTS

During fishing contests or events of any type (tournament, fish-off, or derby), the fish taken by the participants must be released into the waters from which they were taken immediately after the weigh-in. This does not prohibit an individual from keeping or transporting his own daily limit.

TOURNAMENT FISHING PERMIT

A fishing tournament permit from the Department of Natural Resources is needed if:

- 1. Prizes are offered for tagged or marked fish taken from any of the waters listed in the Site Specific Regulations portion of this booklet; or
- 2. The fishing event is conducted over a period of more than five (5) days during any calendar year, and prizes with a total value in excess of \$1,000 are offered, and where fish are taken from any of the waters covered by the Site Specific Regulations portion of this booklet; or
- 3. Special exemption to the daily creel and size limits is requested for: (a) catch, hold for weigh-in, and release tournaments for muskies (all waters); (b) black bass catch and release tournaments, Lake Michigan, rivers and streams except the Mississippi Ohio, and Wabash Rivers are not eligible for permits that exempt participants from daily catch and size limits due to regulation agreements with neighboring states; (c) special catch and release tournaments for which the proceeds go towards youth education and/or a charitable event in which, at a minimum, 50% of all entry fees accrue to the charitable organization for which the event was created. If requested, documentation of charitable donations shall be furnished to the Department; (d) national circuit series catch and release tournaments; and (e) special fishing tournaments/events for which participants are children under 16. disabled persons, or adults over 65.

Requests for a permit will be made on applications provided by the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fisheries. Applications must be received not less than 60 days prior to the first tournament date and must be completely filled out or they will be rejected.

Issuance or denial of a permit shall be based upon the following criteria:

- 1. The capability of the fishery resource to absorb the tournament with minimal impact to its wellbeing.
- 2. The locations of the tournament; catch and release management zones on streams are not eligible for permits.
- 3. The evaluation of the adverse impacts resulting from the additional fishing pressure generated by the tournament on the fish population and the targeted fish species. The evaluation must demonstrate minimal and short-term impacts in order for the Department of Natural Resources to issue the permit. Specific items to be considered
- biological status of the fish population includa. ing the species sought; length of the tournament;
- number of boats and anglers participating in the tournament;
- for tagged fish tournaments; provisions for obtaining and tagging targeted fish species;
- safety of anglers and potential boater-user conflicts.

- 4. Demonstrates adequate provisions for holding, handling, and releasing caught fish. Specific criteria are:
- Tournament officials must be able to certify that all boats must possess a livewell (except muskie fishing tournaments) measuring at least 18" long, 12" deep, and 12" wide and be fitted with a functioning aerator and water pump.
- Following the weigh-in, fish must be released away from the weigh in site and as near to the spot where the catch was made as possible by means of a common release boat or vehicle, or by individual boats. When impractical to release away from the ramp, fish shall be released into the lake as quickly as possible to avoid undue stress. Protecting fish health is the most critical aspect of this subsection.
- If a common release boat or vehicle is utilized, the anglers transporting the fish to be released are exempt from the daily creel limit. A common release boat and holding tank used to transport fish for release shall be adequate to carry a tank constructed of a suitable material (aluminum or fiberglass) with smooth interior walls with no obstructions to trap or injure fish. The tank must be able to hold at least one gallon of water per pound of fish, provide adequate aeration, and maintain constant desirable temperatures to sustain their wellbeing. The tank must have operating hatches to prevent fish from jumping out of the tank and allow quick opening and closing for introduction and removal of fish. Detailed specification on the design and use of a fish holding tank are available upon request from the IDNR, Division of Fisheries. Individual boats and anglers returning their catches of fish back to a release site must adhere to daily creel limits. Tournament officials must be able to certify that a common release boat is being utilized for this tournament.
- For catch, weigh-in, and release muskie tournaments, all boats must have a fish cradle (made from netting) to temporarily hold the muskie in the water while an official determines the length of weight of the fish prior to release. Muskies may not be transported to a weigh-in-site.
- 5. Adequate identification of participants in fishing tournament for law enforcement purposes. Specific criteria include:
- Tournament officials must keep and have available on site a written record of log of daily participants (including names and boat registration numbers) for inspection by Department of Natural Resources officials
- Each participant and boat must be identified in an easily recognizable manner at a distance (such as a ribbon on the trolling motor and patch on the hat or back). On US Army Corps of Engineers (USACOE) reservoirs (Lake Shelbyville, Carlyle Lake, and Rend Lake) a fishing tournament permit and fee is required from the USACOE Lake office prior to applying for an IDNR Fishing Tournament Permit. For all other State-owned and managed sites you must contact that site to see if a usage permit is required from them.

Failure to acquire a permit as referenced above is a petty offense and will result in denial of future applications for a Fishing Tournament Permit by that applicant, sponsor or group for a period up to 5 years.

TROLLING

Trolling is permissible, provided the angler has not more than three poles and lines with not more than two hooks or lures on each.

TROT AND TROLLEY LINES

Hooks on trot lines, throw lines and similar devices shall be spaced not less than 24 inches apart, except on trolley or power lines used in Lake Michigan. Trot, throw lines and similar devices are unlawful on "2 Pole and Line Fishing Only" areas unless specifically authorized in the Site Specific Regulations section of this booklet

TURTLES (Common Snapping Turtle only)

Methods of Taking and Capture Common snapping turtles (Chelydra serpentina) may be taken only by hand, hook and line, or bow and arrow except in the following Illinois counties where bowfishing for common snapping turtles is not permitted: Randolph, Perry, ranklin, Hamilton, White, Gallatin, Saline, Williamson, Jackson, Union, Johnson, Pope, Hardin, Massac, Pulaski, and Alexander.

The alligator snapping turtle (Macrochelys temminckii) is protected and may not be taken by any sport fishing method.

No person shall take common snapping turtles or any other reptile or amphibian by commercial fishing devices, including, hoop nets, traps or seines or by the use of firearms, air guns or gas guns.

All other species of unprotected reptiles and amphibians (excluding common snapping turtles and bullfrogs) may only be taken by hand. This shall not restrict the use of legally taken reptiles or amphibians as bait by anglers.

Any captured reptiles or amphibians which are not to be retained in the possession of the captor shall be immediately released at the site of capture, unless taken with a lethal method (such as bow and arrow, gig, spear, pitchfork) which does not permit "release with no harm". All such taken common snapping turtles and bullfrogs must be kept and counted in the daily catch creel or bag. No culling of such taken species is permitted.

No person shall take or possess any species of reptile or amphibian listed as endangered or threatened in Illinois (17 III. Adm. Code 1010 except as provided by 17 III. Adm. Code 1070).

Season

Common snapping turtles may be taken only between June 15 and August 31, both dates inclusive.

Daily Catch and Possession Limits The daily catch limit for common snapping turtles is 2 with a possession limit of 4.

For indigenous amphibian and reptile taxa, which may only be taken by hand, (excluding common snapping turtles and bullfrogs) the possession limit is 8 collectively with no more than 4 per taxa.

UNATTENDED DEVICES

Any unattended devices used to catch aquatic life or to hold aquatic life is required to have the angler's name and address clearly displayed on the device

WATERFOWL BLINDS

No fishing within 250 yds. of an occupied Department owned or managed waterfowl blind. This includes all sites listed and not listed in this regulations booklet.

STATEWIDE SPORTFISHING REGULATIONS

AQUATIC LIFE	STATEWIDE CREEL AND SIZE LIMITS*
Black Bass (Largemouth, Smallmouth & Spotted Bass)	Daily catch limit is 6 bass, either singly or in the aggregate, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations. In streams and rivers (excluding the mainstem of the Mississippi, Ohio including the Golconda Marina, and Wabash Rivers) the daily creel can contain no more than 3 smallmouth bass. In streams and tributaries statewide, except for the Mississippi, Ohio including the Golconda Marina, Wabash and Illinois Rivers, all smallmouth bass must be immediately released between April 1 and June 15. There is no statewide size limit.
Tiger and Pure Muskies	1 fish (singly or collectively) daily creel limit; minimum length is 36 inches; refer to the Site Specific Sportfishing Regulations. In some waters the minimum length is 42 or 48 inches for pure muskies.
Northern Pike	3 fish daily creel limit with 24 inches minimum length limit except in the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers (refer to Site Specific Sportfishing Regulations.)
Salmon and Trout in Lake Michigan	5 fish (singly or collectively) daily creel limit; no more than 5 fish of any one species (except for Lake Trout where 2 fish is the daily creel limit); for all species the minimum length limit is 10 inches.
Salmon and Trout outside of Lake Michigan	5 fish (singly or collectively) daily creel limit.
Temperate Bass (Striped, White & Hybrid Striped Bass)	No creel limit for fish less than 17 inches long except for certain waters. The creel limit for fish 17 inches or longer is 3 fish in all waters excluding the Mississippi River bordering Missouri where there is a 30 fish daily creel limit and in the Mississippi River bordering lowa where there is a 25 fish daily creel limit (refer to site specific regulations).
Walleye, Sauger, and Hybrid Walleye/Sauger	6 fish (singly or collectively) daily creel limit except in the Mississippi River (refer to Site Specific Sportfishing Regulations); minimum length limit is 14 inches (except in the Mississippi River, Ohio River, Wabash River, or as specified under Site Specific Sportfishing Regulations.
Common Snapping Turtles and Bullfrogs (season June 15 to August 31 both dates inclusive)	The daily catch limit for common snapping turtles is 2 with a possession limit of 4. The daily catch limit for bullfrogs is 8 with a possession limit of 16.
Indigenous Amphibian and Reptile taxa (excluding common snapping turtles and bullfrogs)	Possession limit is 8 collectively with no more than 4 per taxa.

^{*}The above are statewide sportfish regulations. Specific water areas may have sportfish regulations which differ and are more restrictive. Please check the site Specific Sportfish Regulations which follow and are posted (at boat launches and at site offices) at each water area where applicable. State Endangered and Threatened Species may not be taken for any purpose.

SITE SPECIFIC SPORTFISHING REGULATIONS

Fishing regulations, including species of fish, fishing methods and daily creel limits are listed for each water area. The numbers in parentheses refer to the corresponding numbered definitions appearing on pages 8 and 9. If a water area is not listed, or if a specific species is not listed, then statewide restrictions apply. Check the bulletin boards at the specific site for any emergency changes to regulations.

The Department of Natural Resources prefers not to limit fishing opportunities unless it's needed to sustain quality fishing or protect the fisheries resources found in a particular water body. Increasing numbers of people participating in fishing, coupled with more sophisticated anglers, are placing enormous pressure on existing fisheries resources in Illinois.

In order to offset intense fishing pressure on Illinois waters, fisheries managers study both fish populations and angler harvest characteristics to identify overharvest problems. If determined necessary, a special regulation to restrict angler harvest may be implemented to improve the structure and abundance of the fish population, which could result in an improvement of quality fishing.

Various special regulations are used by fisheries managers to restrict angler harvest. A **MINIMUM LENGTH LIMIT** means that fish below a designated length must be released immediately. A **SLOT LENGTH LIMIT** means that fish within a designated length range must be released immediately. A **DAILY CREEL LIMIT** means that no more than a maximum number fish may be taken daily. If a daily creel limit

covers more than one fish species, the number of fish permitted to be taken includes all fish species covered by the regulation added together (in aggregate).

A **2 POLE AND LINE FISHING ONLY** regulation permits the angler to take fish with no more than 2 poles with no more than 2 hooks or lures per line. Also permitted (unless otherwise noted) are legal-sized cast nets, shad scoops and minnow seines for bait fishing. Bullfrogs may be taken by hand, gig, pitchfork, spear, landing net, and hook and line during bullfrog season.

ON WATERS WITHOUT THE 2 POLES AND LINES FISHING ONLY

restriction, up to 50 hooks in total may be used legally on devices permitted under a sport fishing license. Legal devices include: bank poles and lines, dip nets, throw lines, trot lines, buoyed devices (jug fishing), gigs, spears, bow and arrow, and bow and arrow devices. No more than two untagged sport fishing devices (no more than 50 hooks total) under the angler's immediate control are allowed. Each legal device more than two, up to 50 hooks total, must be tagged with the angler's name and address. If attached to a tree, the device must be attached to the main trunk below the water line.

A **CLOSED SEASON** means that fish may not be taken between the specified dates. Waters receiving catchable rainbow trout have closed seasons (spring and/or fall). A closed season prohibiting harvest of rainbow trout is necessary in order for the State to have the trout stocked and permit all anglers to have an equal opportunity to harvest fish on "opening day."

Site Specific Regulations are listed by water area affected. The coverage of the regulation is dictated by the extent of the water area listed and not by the county. In some cases, regulations for a given water area or site may extend beyond the counties listed. The counties listed refer to the location of the dam or outfall for impoundments or mouths of small streams. Since large rivers or streams usually flow through many counties, the term "Multiple" is used rather than listing all counties where the large stream or river flows.

The subsections listed below are referred to by number in the Site Specific Regulations listed. Water areas listed in that section may have numbers in parenthesis which refer to definitions listed below.



- 1) Anglers must not use more than 2 poles and each pole must not have more than 2 hooks or lures attached while fishing, except that legal size cast nets, (in accordance with subsection 810.50(a)(1)) shad scoops, and minnow seines may be used to obtain shad, minnows, and crayfish to use as bait, provided that they are not sold, and except that bullfrogs may be taken by hand, gig, pitchfork, spear, landing net, and hook and line during bullfrog season.
- 2) All jugs set in a body of water shall be under the immediate supervision of the fisherman. Immediate supervision shall be defined as the fisherman being on the water where the jugs are set and readily available to identify jugs to law enforcement officers.
- All largemouth and smallmouth bass taken must be less than 12 inches in total length or greater than 15 inches in total length.
- 4) Except that sport fishermen shall be allowed to use trotlines, jugs, and by hand, except that the use and aid of underwater breathing devices is prohibited. West of Wolf Creek Road, fishing from boats is permitted all year. Trotlines/jugs must be removed from sunrise until sunset from Memorial Day through Labor Day. East of Wolf Creek Road, fishing from boats is permitted from March 15 through September 30. Fishing from the bank is permitted all year only at the Wolf Creek and Route 148 causeways. On the entire lake, jugs and trotlines must be checked daily and must be removed on the last day they are used. It is illegal to use stakes to anchor any trot-lines; they must be anchored only with portable weights and must be removed on the last day they are used. The taking of carp, carpsuckers, shad, drum, buffalo, gar, bowfin and suckers with spear, gig, bow and arrow or archery device is permissible.
- 5) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, carpsuckers, buffalo, gar, bowfin and suckers by pitchfork, gigs, bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices.
- 6) Including the Fox River south of the Illinois-Wisconsin line to the Algonquin Dam and the Nippersink Creek upstream to the Wilmot Road Bridge.
- 7) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, buffalo, suckers and gar by bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices, gigs or spears during May and June.
- Daily catch limit includes striped bass, white bass, yellow bass and hybrid striped bass either singly or in the aggregate.
- 9) Catch and Release Fishing Only means that fish (all or identified species) caught must be immediately released alive and in good condition back into the water from which they came.
- 10) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of October 1 to 5 a.m. on the third Saturday in October (both dates inclusive) that were taken during that period.
- 11) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of March 15 to 5 a.m. on the 1st Saturday in April (both dates inclusive) that were taken during that period.
- 12) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 6 fish per day, no more than one of which shall be greater than 15 inches in length and none of which shall be greater than 12 inches and less than or equal to 15 inches in length.

- 13) Except that jug fishing is permitted from the hours of sunset to sunrise, and except that carp and buffalo may be taken by bow and arrow devices from May 1 through September 30. All jugs must have owner's/user's name and complete address affixed.
- 14) Daily catch limit includes all fish species (either singly or in the aggregate) caught within each of the following fish groupings.
 - Largemouth or Smallmouth Bass

 - Walleye, Sauger, or their hybrid
 Bluegill, Redear Sunfish, or Pumpkinseed
 - 4) Channel or Blue Catfish
- 15) Daily catch limit includes white, black, or hybrid crappie either singly or in the aggregate.
- 16) Daily catch limit includes striped bass, white bass and hybrid striped bass either singly or in the aggregate.
- Daily catch limit shall not exceed 10 fish daily, no more than 3 of which may be 17 inches or longer in length.
- 18) Except that sport fishermen shall be allowed to use trotlines, jugs and bank poles in the portions of the lake that lie north of the Davenport Bridge and northeast of the Parnell Bridge. Sport fishermen may take carp, carpsuckers and buffalo by bow and arrow, bow and arrow devices, gigs and spears on the entire lake, but not within 150 feet of any developed recreation areas.
- It shall be unlawful to enter upon a designated duck hunting area between sunset of the Sunday immediately proceeding opening day of regular duck season through the day before regular duck season and Canada goose season as posted at the site, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 2 weeks prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season
- 20) Carlyle Lake (including its tributary streams and those portions of the Kaskaskia River and Hurricane Creek up to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Carlyle Lake Project boundaries), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Bond, Clinton, and Fayette Counties. Does not include the tailwaters, except that sport fishermen may not use a minnow seine, cast net, or shad scoop for bait collecting between U.S. Route 50 and the Carlyle Lake dam and spillway.
- 21) Lake Shelbyville (including its tributary streams and those portions of the West Okaw and Kaskaskia Rivers up to Lake Shelbyville Project boundaries - including parts of the Lake Shelbyville Fish and Wildlife Management Area), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Shelby and Moultrie Counties. Does not include the tailwater except for the 48" total length and live bait rig requirement for muskellunge (see subsections (b)(40) and (43)).
- Rend Lake (including its tributary streams and those portions of the Big Muddy and Casey Fork Rivers up to the Rend Lake Project boundaries), Rend Lake Project Ponds, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Franklin and Jefferson Counties. Does not include tailwaters, except that sport fishermen may not use a minnow seine, cast net, or shad scoop for bait collecting within 1,000 yards downstream of the Rend Lake Dam and Spillway.
- 23) Daily catch limit for black, white or hybrid crappies, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 20 fish daily, no more than 10 of which

- can be below 10" in total length and no more than 10 of which can be 10" or longer in total length.
- 24) 15" minimum length limit for walleye with no possession of walleye greater than or equal to 20" and less than or equal to 27" in total length protected slot limit.
- 25) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 fish per day, no more than one of which may be equal to or greater than 15 inches in total length and no more than 2 of which may be less than 15 inches in total length.
- Lake Vermilion Trotline and jug fishing allowed north of Boiling Springs Road.
- 27) Except that bank fishing is prohibited. Boat fishing is permitted May 1 through August 31 during the hours of 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. See site for additional regulations and exact opening and closing dates.
- 28) Except that trotlines may be set within 300 feet from shore.
- 29) Except that carp, buffalo, suckers and carpsuckers may be taken by means of pitchfork and gigs (no bow and arrow devices).
- 30) Fishing is permitted from March 15 through September 30, both dates inclusive, from sunrise to sunset. Fishing during all other times of the year is illegal and not permitted.
- 31) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 fish daily, no more than one of which may be equal to or greater than 15 inches in total length and no more than 2 of which may be less than 12 inches in total length.
- 32) Daily catch limit includes striped bass, white bass, yellow bass and hybrid striped bass, either singly or in the aggregate, no more than 4 of which may be 15 inches or longer in length.
- 33) It shall be unlawful to trespass upon a designated waterfowl hunting area during the 7 days prior to the regular duck season, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck and Canada goose season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to trespass upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 2 weeks prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.
- 34) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, buffalo, suckers and gar by bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices, gigs, or spears from May 1 through August 31.
- 35) 14" minimum length limit for walleye, sauger or hybrid walleye with a protected slot (no possession) of fish 18" to 24" in total length. There is a 4 fish daily creel of which only 1 can be greater than 24".
- 36) Except that sportfishermen may not use a minnow seine, minnow trap, cast net, or shad scoop for bait collecting in the following water areas:

Charleston Lower Channel Lake tailwaters from that portion of theEmbarras River from the Charleston Lower Channel Lake Dam downstream to the Route 130 Bridge.

Clinton Lake tailwaters from that portion of Salt Creek from the Clinton Dam downstream to the Route 10 Bridge

Cook County Forest Preserve District Waters (except in the Des Plaines River)

Lake Decatur tailwaters from that portion of the Sangamon River from the Lake Decatur Dam downstream to the Route 48 Bridge.

- 37) All smallmouth bass taken must be less than 12 inches in total length or greater than 18 inches in total length. Only 1 bass greater than 18 inches and 2 bass less than 12 inches may be taken in the creel daily.
- 38) All largemouth and smallmouth bass taken must be less than 14 inches in total length or greater than 18 inches in total length. Only 1 bass greater than 18 inches and 5 bass less than 14 inches may be taken in the creel daily.

- 39) Powerton Lake shall be closed to boat traffic, except for legal waterfowl hunters, from one week prior to regular waterfowl season to February 15, and closed to all unauthorized entry during the regular goose and duck season.
- 40) The 48 inch total length limit on pure muskellunge applies to that body of water listed as well as any tailwaters as defined below:

Evergreen Lake (McLean County) – including the portion of Six Mile Creek below the Evergreen Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with the Mackinaw River.

Forbes State Lake (Marion County) - including tailwaters.

Fox Chain O' Lakes (Lake/McHenry Counties) – including the Fox River south of the Wisconsin-Illinois boundary to the Algonquin Dam and the Nippersink Creek upstream to the Wilmot Road Bridge.

Kinkaid Lake (Jackson County) – including the portion of Kinkaid Creek below the Kinkaid Lake Dam downstream to the Route 149 Bridge.

Lake Mingo and Kennekuk Cove Park Ponds (Vermilion County) – no tailwaters.

Lake Shelbyville (Moultrie/Shelby Counties) – including the portion of the Kaskaskia River below the Lake Shelbyville Dam downstream to the State Route 128 Road Bridge near Cowden.

Otter Lake (Macoupin County) – including the portion of Otter Creek below Otter Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with East Otter Creek.

Pierce Lake (Winnebago County) – including the portion of Willow Creek below the Pierce Lake Dam downstream to Forest Hills Road

Shabbona Lake (DeKalb County) – including that portion of Indian Creek below the Shabbona Lake Dam downstream to Shabbona Grove Road.

Spring Lakes (North and South) (Tazewell County) - no tailwaters.

- 41) It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl hunting areas during the 10 days prior to the start of the regular duck season, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 10 days prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.
- 42) During duck season, walk-in only access for fishing from the bank is permitted after 1:00 p.m.
- 43) When using live bait, all live bait in excess of 8" in total length shall be rigged with a quick set rig. The hook shall be immediately set upon the strike. A quick set rig is defined as follows: a live bait rig with up to 2 treble hooks attached anywhere on the live bait; single hooks are prohibited. This subsection (b)(43) does not apply to trotlines, jug lines, etc., if allowed on the lake.
- 44) Except that sport fishermen may take carp from boat by bow and arrow and bow and arrow devices, but not within 150 feet of any developed recreation areas.
- 45) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, buffalo, suckers, and gar by bow and arrow devices, gigs or spears (except during waterfowl season) but not within 200 yards of any developed recreational areas.
- 46) All large or smallmouth bass taken must be less than 12 inches in total length or greater than 18 inches in total length. Only 1 bass greater than 18 inches and 2 bass less than 12 inches may be taken in the creel daily.
- 47) 14" minimum length limit for walleye, sauger or hybrid walleye with a protected slot (no possession) of fish 18" to 26" in total length. There is a 3 fish daily creel of which only 1 can be greater than 26".



ALLIGATOR SNAPPING TURTLES ARE A STATE ENDANGERED SPECIES AND FULLY PROTECTED BY LAW

The State of Illinois is reintroducing the native alligator snapping turtle to strategic watersheds in Illinois.

You can help recover this unique reptile by:

- Learning the difference between common snapping turtles and alligator snappers.
- Reporting observations of alligator snapping turtles. *PLEASE SEND PHOTOS*
- · Protecting river corridors and associated wetland habitat.
- Reporting any illegal capture, take or possession of alligator snapping turtles.



Alligator: 3 rows of prominent, pyramid- shaped projections on shell; large head; pronounced beak; worm-like lure on tongue. May NOT be taken in Illinois.



Common: Smooth shell with moderate projections; long neck and tail with sawtooth projections. These turtles may legally be taken with an Illinois fishing license. The daily catch limit is 2 turtles and possession limit is 4.

ILLINOIS SPEAR/BOW STATE RECORDS

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources has inaugurated state record recognition awards for spearing and bowfishing in designated Illinois' waters. Archery and spearing harvest of eligible fish species has grown dramatically in the past decade and the Department wants to acknowledge those angler's and their sport. Those rules are summarized below:

 Fish must be legally harvested using spear or gig, pitchfork, underwater spear gun, bow and arrow or archery devise. Spearing and bowfishing is not permitted in waters listed in Site Specific Regulations

- as "2 Pole and Line Fishing Only" (except as listed by notation).
- All certification rules and procedures in place for hook and line state record acknowledgement apply for spearing/bowfishing. See Rules for Sport Fishing Awards on page 39.
- To be considered for a Spearing/Bowfishing State Record Award, the fish must be an eligible species and exceed the minimum weight requirement or the current record.





ILLINOIS SPORT FISHING AWARDS PROGRAM

The Division of Fisheries offers several angler recognition awards for fish caught in Illinois waters. Junior angler awards are for young anglers under 16 years of age catching their first Illinois fish. Catch and Release, Big Fish, Master Angler, Grand Slam, and State Record are available to any angler meeting the eligibility requirements outlined in the rules. Refer to the rules section for more information.

Available on the **www.ifishillinois.org** website are the Jr. Angler, Catch & Release, and Big Fish certificates. They may be downloaded and printed from your personal computer. Completed applications with associated information for Master Angler, Grand Slam, and State Record must be sent to the Division of Fisheries for processing. Awards are returned to the angler at the end of the current fishing season.

SPORT FISHING AWARDS (see RULES SECTION for further information)

- A STATE RECORD AWARD patch, engraved wall plaque, and certificate will be awarded to the
 angler who catches a fish, only of the species listed above, which equals or exceeds the weight of
 the current STATE RECORD. All STATE RECORD fish must be certified by a DNR fisheries biologist.
 Applications for the STATE RECORD award are available to download from the www.ifishillinois.org website. Completed applications, DNR certification, and a photo documenting your catch
 must be mailed into the DNR Division of Fisheries.
- A GRAND SLAM AWARD certificate, pin, and patch are awarded annually to anglers catching at
 least one representative fish (which meets or exceeds the minimum lengths or minimum weights –
 see eligible fish species table) from five (5) of the six (6) family categories of Illinois fish (Catfish,
 Black Bass, Temperate Bass, Esocid, Salmonid, and Perch). Applications for the GRAND SLAM
 award are available to download from the www.ifishillinois.org website and mail (along with a
 photo of each catch for documentation) into the DNR Division of Fisheries no later than January 30.
- A MASTER ANGLER AWARD certificate and pin are awarded annually to anglers catching five (5) different species of fish (see listing of eligible fish) which meet or exceed the minimum lengths or minimum weights. Applications for the MASTER ANGLER award are available to download from the www.ifishillinois.org website. Once completed, the application must be mailed into the DNR Division of Fisheries no later than January 30.
- A BIG FISH AWARD certificate will be awarded to the angler who catches and keeps a fish, only of
 the species listed above, which equals or exceeds the minimum qualifying weight. Certificates for
 successful anglers may be printed directly from the www.ifishillinois.org website.
- A CATCH AND RELEASE AWARD certificate will be awarded to the angler who catches and
 releases an eligible fish (see list), which equals or exceeds the minimum qualifying length. Award
 certificates for successful anglers may be printed directly from the www.ifishillinois.org website.
- A JUNIOR ANGLER AWARD certificate is available for download from the www.ifishillinois.org
 website to an angler under 16 years of age who catches their first Illinois fish. Award certificates for
 successful anglers may be printed directly from the website.

RULES FOR SPORT FISHING AWARDS

These rules apply to STATE RECORD, GRAND SLAM, MASTER ANGLER, BIG FISH, CATCH AND RELEASE, AND JUNIOR ANLGER award entries:

- Fish must be caught legally by pole and line from Illinois waters. Fish caught by trot line, jugs, bank poles, gigs, spears, bow and arrow, nets, seines, and snagging are not eligible.
- Fish caught from Licensed Daily Fee Fishing Areas are not eligible.
- Total length is to be measured from the tip of the snout, with mouth closed to the tip of the tail to the nearest 1/8 inch. Girth is measured at the greatest distance around the fish circumference).
- The Illinois Department of Natural Resources reserves the right to reject an entry based upon its investigation on the identification, methods used in catching, and the accuracy of measurement and weighing.
- Fish eligible for all SPORT FISHING AWARDS (excluding the GRAND SLAM AWARD) are listed in the "Eligible Fish Species Table" along with qualifying minimum lengths and weights.
- 6. Fish species eligible for the GRAND SLAM AWARD by family category include:

Anglers catching at least one eligible fish species from five (5) of the six (6) above family categories meeting or exceeding the qualifying minimum lengths or weights must complete an application (along with a photo documenting the catch) and mail the entry to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, no later than January 30 to cover the previous calendar year's fishing activities.

- 7. Fish species eligible for the MASTER ANGLER AWARD include all listed fish species (see the "Eligible Fish Species Table") which meet or exceed the qualifying minimum lengths or weights. Successful anglers must complete an application (along with a photo documenting the catch) and mail the entry to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, no later than January 30 to cover the previous calendar year's fishing activities.
- 8. Each STATE RECORD, GRAND SLAM, AND MASTER ANGLER award application must be accompanied by a clear, side-view photograph for each of the fish caught, preferably of the angler with the fish. The entry and photograph become property of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Photos cannot be returned.
- Fish entered for a STATE RECORD award must be weighed on a scale certified legal for trade in front of two witnesses.
- 10. A fish entered for STATE RECORD fish must be kept intact until it has been certified, and when necessary, genetically confirmed by an Illinois Department of Natural Resources Fishery Biologist.
- 11. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources reserves the right to reproduce, duplicate, or otherwise copy, via a body cast, any certified STATE RECORD fish. Duplicate mounts will be used solely by the Department for display purposes and will acknowledge the record holder.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources is requesting this information as outlined under the Fish Code, Chapter 515. This information is required in order for you to qualify for a STATE RECORD, GRAND SLAM, OR MASTER ANGLER award.

ILLINOIS ICE FISHING REGULATIONS

A sport fishing license is required for ice fishing. The ice angler may use a maximum of three poles or tip-ups with no more than two hooks on each line. Sites with two pole and line fishing only restriction may use a maximum of two poles or tip-ups. Holes cut in the ice are limited to 12-inch diameter or less. Shelter structures are limited to portable construction of metal or wood framework, covered with canvas, paper, plastic material or similar fabric. Each shelter shall have the name and address of the owner attached, and after March 1 the shelter must be removed when not in use, and not left unattended at any time. All poles and tip-ups shall be constantly attended and kept under observation by the angler.

Trout Program

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources reinstated its Catchable Trout Program in 1994. Various lakes and streams are annually stocked with catchable size (10-11 inches) trout in the spring or fall. Anglers are prohibited from taking (harvesting) trout at any of the stocking sites before the legal opening. Spring catchable trout season opens at 5 a.m. on April 6, 2013 and April 5, 2014 while fall season opens at 5 a.m. on Oct. 19, 2013 and Oct. 18, 2014.

To legally take (harvest) rainbow and/or brown trout from any waters which receive catchable trout or hatchery stockings of trout, anglers must have a fishing license and inland trout stamp, unless they are under 16 years of age, blind or disabled, or Illinois residents on leave from the Armed Forces. A daily limit of five trout per angler is enforced.

Fishing licenses and inland trout stamps are available at sporting good stores and other vendors located near the catchable trout fishing sites, and at the IDNR's five regional offices at Sterling, Bartlett, Clinton, Alton, and Benton. This program is funded through the sale of inland trout stamps.

FEDERAL AID IN SPORT FISH RESTORATION ACT

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources receives monies authorized by the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Act of 1950 (Dingell-Johnson Act). This money is received as 75 percent reimbursement on approved projects. This Act imposed a manufacturer's excise tax on fishing rods, reels, creels, and artificial lures. The Act also protects angler's license fees by prohibiting their diversion to other than approved purposes. In 1984, the Wallop-Breaux Amendment of the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Act (D-J) was passed and allowed for expansion of the tax base to include essentially all items of fishing tackle, electric trolling motors and "flasher" type fish finders (sonar devices), motorboat fuel taxes, and import duties on fishing tackle and boats. Again in 1990, the Fund was increased by an additional increase in the federal excise tax on gasoline, and also the deposit of the federal tax on gasoline from small non-highway engines into the fund. This Sport Fish Restoration Program is administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in partnership with the states.

Funds may be used for almost any type of sport fishery restoration, management, or enhancement project. The 1984 Wallop-Breaux Amendment mandated that each state must spend at least 10% for boat access projects, and allowed each state to use up to 10% of its apportion-

ment for aquatic resources education. The required 10% to be spent for boating improvements was increased to 12.5% in 1992, and 15.0% in 1998. The Aquatic Resources Education allowance was increased to 15.0% in 1998.

An annual apportionment of these monies is made available to each state. Forty percent of this amount is based on the state's land and water area in relation to the total land water of the U.S. Sixty percent of this amount is based on the number of paid sport fishing license holders in

each state in relation to all the paid fishing license holders in the U.S.

The 2012 apportionment of Sport Fish Restoration Program monies to Illinois was \$7,086,724. This was used by the Department for fisheries management of state and public waters, fish production and stocking, federal aid coordination; for state Universities and research agencies to conduct investigations throughout the State to manage the fisheries resources in our streams, boundary rivers, impoundments, reservoirs and Lake Michigan; and for boat access improvements.

The future of sport fishing in Illinois has been greatly enhanced thanks to Dingell-Johnson/Wallop-Breaux.

EVERY TIME YOU LEAVE A BODY OF WATER:

- REMOVE any visible mud, plants, fish, or animals from equipment.
- DRAIN water from your boat, motor, bilge, live well and bait buckets.
- **DRY** everything with a quick-dry towel.
- DISPOSE of bait in the trash.

Effective January 1, 2013, the Illinois Boat Registration and Safety Act has been amended to prevent the spread of invasive aquatic plants and animals by boats, trailers and vehicles. It is now illegal to enter OR leave a waterbody with aquatic plants and animals attached to your boat or trailer. Travel on Illinois highways with aquatic plants or animals attached is also prohibited. Always **Remove**, **Drain**, and **Dry** to comply with the new law!

AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES

Bighead and Silver Carp WATCH

Bighead and silver carp (Asian carp) are invasive fish spreading within the Mississippi River and Great Lakes regions causing harm to humans, native fish and wildlife. Both species have low-set eyes and a large, upturned mouth, and may grow to be more than 60 lbs. and 4 ft.

Juvenile Asian carp may be difficult to distinguish from local baitfish species such as gizzard shad.








You can help!

Hydrilla WATCH

Hydrilla is a non-native plant invading and causing harm to waters in nearby states. It forms thick, submersed mats that hinder fishing and boating, and harm fish and wildlife.



Hydrilla looks similar to native elodea, which is found in many Illinois lakes and rivers. However, Hydrilla has whorls of 4 or more spearshaped leaves around the stem (native = 2-3), leaves with coarse teeth along the edges (native = no teeth), and bulb-like tubers in the soil (native = no tubers).





You can help!

Early detection of new populations of Hydrilla may limit the spread and allow for its removal. Report new sightings of this plant – call 1-877-STOP-ANS (1-877-786-7267).

FISHING ETHICS AND SAFETY

Code of Angling Ethics

Ethics cannot be dictated. Angling ethics develop with time, experience and interaction with others. The following code is offered as a guideline to increase awareness and encourage discussion.

An Ethical Angler:

- Understands fishing and boating regulations.
- · Cares about aquatic and marine habitats.
- Keeps only fish they will eat, and properly releases the rest.
- Is respectful of others anglers and non-anglers alike.
- Leaves no monofilament line or trash, even if left by others.
- Shares expertise with less experienced anglers.
- Cooperates with authorities.
- · Fishes and boats safely.
- Preserves the sportfishing tradition.



Fishing Safety Tips

- In selecting a waterfront site, be sure that the area is free from underwater hazards, clean and, if necessary, large enough to accommodate everyone in your group.
- Inspect waterfronts daily the natural environment is subject to change without notice.
- When choosing a site for fishing, always consider safety factors. Because fishing is practiced in a variety of environments, evaluate factors specific to safety in each environment.
- Weather is always a factor. Set up a weather committee or rotate weather forecasting responsibilities.
 Carry a transistor National Weather Service radio.
- Always wear footgear appropriate to the conditions.
- Stay dry, warm, and protected from the elements.
 Wear a waterproof sunscreen with an SPF (sun protection factor) of at least 15. Wear thin layers of clothing, and progress outward to include water and wind protection as the final layer.
- Use appropriate insect protection measures, including dressing properly and using repellents.
- Keep fishing knives sharp and cover the blade when not in use.
- Handle fish carefully.
- Use safety glasses at all times when casting.
- Establish and enforce firm rules for behavior around hooks.

ILLINOIS FISH AND YOUR HEALTH

Because some fish have become contaminated with chemicals, Illinois has established fish advisories for certain bodies of water in the state. These advisories are issued by the Illinois Fish Contaminant Monitoring Program (IFCMP), which consists of staff from the departments of Agriculture, Natural Resources, and Public Health, and Illinois Emergency Management Agency and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. What are the criteria for the fish advisories?

Fish from areas with suspected or known contamination and from areas with no suspected contamination have been collected and analyzed by the IFCMP since 1974. The samples are tested for 14 chemicals known to cause adverse human health effects. After analysis, the advisory is created by determining which fish are unsafe to eat, which should be eaten in limited quantities and which can be eaten in unlimited amounts.

The most recent Illinois advisories are related to fish contaminated with polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), chlordane and mercury. A statewide methyl mercury advisory for predator fish in every Illinois water body also has been established. In order to protect the most sensitive populations, pregnant or nursing women, women of childbearing age, and children less than 15 years of age are advised to eat no more than one meal per week of predator fish.

How do fish become contaminated with PCBs?

Fish get PCBs in their bodies from living in contaminated water or near contaminated sediment, and by eating contaminated food. PCBs are a group of more than 200 similar manmade chemicals that were used widely in electrical equipment like capacitors and transformers. More than 1 billion pounds of PCBs were manufactured in the United States. Because of the health effects associated with exposure to PCBs, commercial production of PCBs ended in 1977. In 1979, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) banned all use of PCBs.

How do fish become contaminated with chlordane?

Chlordane builds up in the fatty tissue of fish living in contaminated water or near contaminated sediment, and by eating contaminated food. Chlordane is a manmade pesticide used in the United States from 1948 to 1988. Chlordane is a thick liquid that has a mild, irritating smell. In 1983, USEPA limited chlordane to only killing termites because of concern about the damage to the environment and harm to human health. In 1988, all uses of chlordane were banned.

How do fish become contaminated with mercury?

Mercury is stored in the muscle of fish that eat mercury-contaminated food or live in mercury-contaminated water. Mercury is a metal that occurs naturally in small amounts in the environment. It also is thought to come from burning coal or trash, as well as from industrial waste. Mercury gets into lakes and rivers several ways, including rain and runoff. When conditions are right in the water, certain kinds of bacteria change inorganic mercury into methylmercury. This form of mercury is one of the most likely to get into fish.

How can eating contaminated fish affect human health?

Eating contaminated fish does not necessarily mean adverse health effects will occur. The potential for exposed persons to experience adverse health effects depends on:

- · the specific chemicals in the fish,
- · the amount of chemicals in the fish,
- · the amount of contaminated fish eaten, and
- · the health condition of the person eating the contaminated fish.

While there is no immediate health threat from eating contaminated fish, there may be from long-term, low-level exposure to chemicals found in fish listed in the advisories.

Laboratory tests in animals have shown that long-term exposure to high doses of some PCBs and chlordane cause adverse health effects, including cancer, liver damage, reproductive damage and developmental damage. Health effects associated with long-term mercury exposure may include damage to the brain, kidney, lungs and a developing fetus.

The fish advisory is intended to protect children from potential developmental problems. Women who eat highly-contaminated fish for many years before becoming pregnant may have children who are slower to develop and learn. Adults are less likely to have health problems at the same low levels of exposure that affect children, so the meal advice contained in the advisory may be overprotective for women beyond child bearing years and adult men.

Should people stop eating fish?

No! Fish are nutritious. When properly prepared, fish provide a diet high in protein and generally low in saturated fats and play a role a maintaining a healthy, well-balanced diet. Many doctors suggest eating a half pound of fish each week is helpful in preventing heart disease. Almost any kind of fish may have health benefits when it replaces a high-fat source of protein in the diet. Steps can be taken to reduce risks from eating contaminated fish. The fat of the fish is where most of the contaminants, except mercury, are stored. As fish grow older, they tend to develop a higher overall body fat content. By choosing to eat younger, smaller fish, exposure to contaminants is reduced. Smaller fish have less fat and have retained fewer contaminants. By following the cooking and cleaning advice in the advisory, exposure to contaminants in fish will be reduced.

STATEWIDE AND SITE SPECIFIC BOWFISHING REGULATIONS

Fish Code (statewide application):

(515 ILCS 5/10-110) (from Ch. 56, par. 10-110)

Sec. 10-110. Taking carp, buffalo, suckers, gar, shad, drum, and bowfin. Carp, buffalo, suckers, gar, shad, drum, and bowfin may be taken by means of a pitchfork, underwater spear gun, bow and arrow or bow and arrow device, spear, or gig. Each person taking fish by these means shall possess a valid sport fishing license. Fish taken by these means shall not be sold or bartered. No other fish may be taken in this State by these means.

Fish Administrative Rule 810:

- Only fish species listed in A.R. 810 may be taken by bowfishing and other legal methods as per creel limits identified for each.

In Illinois, the **river redhorse** is protected as a State threatened species. Though biologists have found the fish in stretches of the Fox, Des Plaines, DuPage, Kankakee Rivers, and also in the Illinois River upstream of Spring Valley, pollution and sedimentation from agriculture and urbanization compromise many of the clean spawning gravels the fish needs and reduce populations of the filter-feeding animals it depends on for food. For these reasons, scientists now treat the sensitive redhorse as an indicator species to show where river conditions have declined or improved.

In Illinois, the **greater redhorse** is protected as a State Endangered Species. Biologists have found the fish in stretches of the Fox, Des Plaines, DuPage, Kankakee Rivers, and also in the Illinois River upstream of Spring Valley. The largest of the redhorse (Moxostoma) species, the greater redhorse (Moxostoma valenciennesi) is a large, stout freshwater fish with a dark brown to copper back, yellowish sides and a whitish belly. The scales on the back and sides have a dark spot at their base. The greater redhorse's tail fin is red, and the other fins are yellow to orange or reddish. The greater redhorse has a large head and a large mouth, with thick lips that are covered in folds In adults, the dorsal fin has a straight or slightly convex edge, and the tail fin is large and forked, with two pointed lobe. The female greater redhorse is generally larger than the male, and breeding males have large, white tubercles on the tail fin and anal fin.

- 35) Sangamon River to South Line, NE 1/4, Sec. 1, T15N, R4W, 3rd PM in Sangamon County, which is located approximately

- one mile south of the Mechanicsburg Road bridge. This area is shown on the Mechanicsburg, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 36) Sangamon River: South Fork to South Line, Sec. 33, T16N, R4W, 3rd PM in Sangamon County, which is located approximately two miles upstream from the mouth. This area is shown on the Springfield-East, 7.5 minute USGS guadrangle map;
- 37) Macoupin Creek to East Line, Sec. 25, T9N, R13W, 3rd PM in Green and Jersey Counties, which is located approximately one mile downstream from the junction with Boyer Creek. This area is shown on the Boyer Creek, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 38) Otter Creek to East Line of Sec. 3, T7N, R13W, 3rd PM in Jersey County, which is located approximately two miles east of the Illinois Highway 100 bridge. This area is shown on the Nutwood, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 39) Kaskaskia River to East Line, SW 1/4, Sec. 31, T8N, R2E, 3rd PM, which is located nine miles south and two miles west of Herrick. This area is shown on the Vera, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 40) Big Muddy River to East Line T8S, R2W, 3rd PM in Jackson County, which is located approximately one mile northwest of the Southern Illinois Airport. This area is shown on the Murphysboro, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 41) Ohio River;
- 42) Wabash River;
- 43) Vermilion River (Wabash River Basin) to West Line, T19N, R11W, 2nd PM in Vermilion County, which is located approximately one mile upstream from the junction with the North Fork. This area is shown on the Danville, SW, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 44) Little Wabash River to the Illinois Highway 1 bridge in Carmi in White County:
- 45) Saline River to junction of North Fork and South Fork;
- 46) Saline River: North Fork to North Line, Sec. 5, T8S, R8E, 3rd PM in Gallatin County, which is located approximately three miles south of the junction of Illinois Highway 141 and U.S. Highway 45. This area is shown on the Ridgway, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 47) Saline River: South Fork to West Line, T9S, R8E, 3rd PM in Gallatin County, which is located at the Gallatin-Saline County line. This area is shown on the Equality, 7.5 minute USGS quadrangle map;
- 48) Horseshoe Lake (Alexander County).


The following public bodies of water are primarily artificial navigable waters that were opened to public use.

- 8) Marseilles Canal (LaSalle County);
- 9) Chain of Rocks Canal (Madison County);
- 10) Relocated Kaskaskia River.

The following public bodies of water are navigable waters that were dedicated to public use. This list is incomplete. It is believed there are numerous channels and slips in subdivisions on the margins of public bodies of water which have been dedicated by plat. Additional channels and slips have been dedicated by common law.

Many nuisance species, such as the zebra mussel and Asian carp, have invaded the lakes and rivers of Illinois. These non-native species impact our native species through competition, predation and habitat alteration. They can also impact our economy by

When you leave a body of water:

- Remove any visible mud, plants, fish or animals before transporting equipment.
- Eliminate water from equipment before transporting.
- Clean and dry anything that comes into contact with water (boats, trailers, equipment, clothing, dogs, etc.).
- Never release plants, fish or animals into a body of water unless they came out of that body of water.

Prevent the transport of nuisance species. Clean all recreational equipment. Particularly waders/boots.

- Fishermen and hunters, you now have the ability to purchase fishing and hunting licenses and stamps over the Internet and immediately print it out on your printer! Boat registration renewals may also be done over the Internet.
- The transaction is encrypted for security purposes when traveling through the Internet. You merely complete the application and send it to us over the Internet. The system upon receipt, and provided the information submitted is correct, will process your payment (credit card payment only) and send back to your screen a web page containing an electronic license for printing and placing in your wallet. You can reduce the license size and you can retain multiple copies for your wallet, tackle box, etc. Each copy must have an original signature.

ANGLER CREEL SURVEYS

Regular Creel Surveys

A creel survey is one of the most valuable tools available to the fisheries manager, since it provides both angler characteristics and a measure of anglers' catch of fish (both harvest and release). Thus, careful analyses and evaluation of creel data indicate the relative success of fisheries management activities and fish stocking efforts. Creel surveys, usually conducted by trained clerks, are designed to provide a great variety of information on fish caught by anglers such as: number of fish caught, catch rate, and length/weight characteristics of fish caught. In addition, angler characteristics such as length of fishing trip, distance traveled and fish species sought are determined from the creel interview. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fisheries conducts a number

of creel surveys on different lakes and rivers each year. Anglers encountering creel clerks should make every effort to cooperate and provide the information requested by the creel clerk.

Special Mail-In Muskie Creel Survey

The Department of Natural Resources and the Illini Muskie Alliance are co-sponsoring a mail-in Muskie Creel Survey for anglers catching any size muskie. Successful anglers should complete one of the postage-paid mail-in cards as soon as possible following the catch. Mail-in cards are available at the site office, concession stand, at most

local bait and tackle stores, or by contacting any Department of Natural Resources office. Anglers can also report their muskie catch at the following web address: www.dnr.state.il.us/fish/muskiecard.htm



Natural Shorelines are Good for Fishing

By keeping shorelines natural, you can help protect water quality and improve fish habitat. A shoreline without trees and shrubs can get washed away, making the water muddy and unsuitable for fish. If you live near a lake or river, plant a buffer strip along the water's edge using tree, shrubs, wildflowers or other native plants. Trees and other vegetation filter pollution and provide shade, shelter, habitat, and food critical for bass, trout, and other fish to thrive and reproduce. REVOCATIONS/SUSPENSIONS FOR VIOLATIONS



POINT SYSTEM

On July 6, 2004 several changes to the point system for license revocations/privilege suspensions went into effect. The changes are indicated in the shaded areas, and apply to violations occurring on or after July 6, 2004.

TYPES OF OFFENSES

Type I Offenses = those offenses related to commercial/business activities covered under the Timber Buyer, Taxidermist, Aquaculture, Fish Dealer, Minnow Dealer, Mussel Dealer, Game and Game Bird Breeder, Wild Game Food Dealer, Fur Bearing Animal Breeder, Fur Tanner or Migratory Waterfowl Hunting Area licenses and permits

Type II Offenses = All other offenses related to activities covered under licenses and permits. (Example: hunting, trapping, fishing, etc.)

Offenses (Plants)

COMPUTATION OF SUSPENSION PERIODS

For Type I Offenses, any person who, within an 18 month period, accumulates 13 or more points in a single group shall have all licenses, permits and stamps relevant to engage in the activity revoked, and the person's privilege to engage in the activity shall be suspended for a period of time that equals one month for each point accumulated. All accumulated points shall remain in effect for 18 months from the date of arrest that resulted in the point accumulation and shall not be removed or reduced by a period of suspension. Any second or subsequent suspension imposed shall be served consecutively to any earlier suspension.

For Type II Offenses, any person who, within a 36 month period accumulates 13 or more points in a single group shall have all licenses, permits and stamps relevant to that type and group revoked, and the person's privilege to engage in the activity covered by the type and group shall be suspended for a period of time that equals one month for each point accumulated. All accumulated points shall remain in effect for 36 months from the date of arrest that resulted in the point accumulation and shall not be removed or reduced by a period of suspension. Any second or subsequent suspension imposed shall be served consecutively to any earlier suspension.

SINGLE INCIDENT RULE

The Single Incident Rule shall not be applied in any cases where the highest level violation is a Class A Misdemeanor or higher (12 points or greater) or in cases where violations occurred while the individual was suspended.

In the event that multiple findings of guilt are entered against an individual arising out of a single incident or act, full points shall be assessed only for the finding of guilt with the highest point level with additional points being assessed for the remaining findings of guilt as follows:

Petty Offense = 1 point Class C Misendeavor = 2 points Class B Misdemeanor = 3 points

NEW POINT SYSTEM FOR REVOCATIONS/SUSPENSIONS CONTD.

EXAMPLES:

- A) Type I Findings of Guilt for Separate Incidents: A person found guilty of violations of no taxidermy license and failure to keep proper records (both Class B Misdemeanors, 9 points each) occurring on different dates is assessed the full 18 points, and revocation of taxidermy license and suspension of taxidermy privileges only is imposed for a period of 18 months.
- **B)** Type I Findings of Guilt for a Single Incident: A person found guilty of the same violations as A) above (2 Class B Misdemeanors) arising out of a single incident has no revocation/suspension imposed, with 12 points assessed (9+3).
- C) Type II Findings of Guilt for Separate Incidents: A person found guilty of unlawful possession of freshly killed whitetail deer during closed season (Class A Misdemeanor 12 points) and taking an over limit of quail (Petty Offense 3 points) has his/her hunting license, trapping license, migratory waterfowl stamp, habitat stamp, deer/turkey permits, etc. revoked, and Type II privileges suspended in Group A for a period of 15 months.

D) Type II - Findings of Guilt for a Single Incident

- 1) A person found guilty of violations of taking game birds with a rifle and no hunting license (Class A Misdemeanor and Petty Offense) arising out of a single incident is assessed 15 points and suspension imposed as described in C) above. The Single Incident Rule does not apply to cases where the highest level violation is a Class A Misdemeanor or higher.
- 2) A person found guilty of violations of taking deer without a permit and no hunting license (Class B Misdemeanor and Petty Offense) arising out of a single incident has no revocation/suspension imposed, with 10 points assessed (9 + 1).

E) Imposition of Subsequent Suspensions

- 1) The person in C) above completes the 15 month suspension, and two months later (less than 36 months from the date of the first violation) again unlawfully possesses a freshly killed whitetail deer during closed season and is found guilty (12 points). This person's licenses are again revoked and privileges suspended for a period of 27 months (15 + 12).
- 2) The person in C) above is found guilty of a violation under the Wildlife Code that occurred during the time that his/her privileges were suspended 60 additional points are assessed and a second suspension is imposed, to run consecutively after the first suspension (15 + 60 = 75 months total).

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

The Department of Natural Resources may also hold an administrative hearing to revoke licenses/suspend privileges in certain egregious cases, wherein a person has had a finding of guilt (including supervision or conditional discharge) in a circuit court of the State of Illinois or by a U.S. District Court in an Illinois District, regardless of whether or not sufficient points for suspension have been reached.

In addition, the Illinois Fish and Aquatic Life Code and Wildlife Code provisions regarding the revocation of licenses/permits and suspension of privileges also include the following: Any person whose license or permit has been revoked or his/her privileges suspended may not, during the period of revocation/suspension 1) be in the company of any person engaged in the activity covered by the revocation/suspension, or; 2) serve as a guide, outfitter or facilitator for any person who is engaged or prepared to engage in the activity covered by the revocation/suspension, until such time as the period of revocation/suspension is completed and the appropriate licenses/permits have been obtained.

REVOCATIONS/SUSPENSIONS IN OTHER STATES AND CANADA

It shall be unlawful for any person to be issued or obtain an Illinois license or permit or while in Illinois, engaged in any activity regulated by the Illinois Fish and Aquatic Life Code or Wildlife Code during the time that person's privileges to engage in the same or similar activities are suspended or revoked by another state, by a federal agency or by a province of Canada.

PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF REVOCATIONS/SUSPENSIONS/DENIAL OF PRIVILEGE

Persons who violate the prohibitions of their revocation/suspension/denial of privileges shall be guilty of a Class A Misdemeanor with penalties of up to 364 days jail time and up to \$2500.00 in fines.

BOUNDARY RIVERS SPORT FISHING

Illinois-lowa

Officers of Illinois and Iowa will recognize and accept valid sport fishing licenses of either state when legally possessed and used by hook-and-line anglers on the Mississippi River proper forming a common boundary between Illinois and Iowa, including its backwater lakes and sloughs contiguous with the flow of waters in the main channel; provided that you do not fish from or attach any device or equipment to the main bank of the Mississippi under the jurisdiction of the state where you are not licensed to fish. You can not fish in any tributaries of the opposite state. You must conform to the regulations of the state in which you are fishing unless the regulations of your licensing state are more restrictive, then you must conform with the more restrictive regulations. The center of the navigation channel is the boundary between Illinois and Iowa. Tournaments fishing lows waters must have low tournament permits, even if launching from the Illinois side of the river.

Illinois-Missouri

Officers of Illinois and Missouri will recognize and accept valid sport fishing licenses of either state when legally possessed and used in the Mississippi River and its backwaters within the boundary of Missouri adjacent to the state of Illinois. Persons licensed in only one state may also fish in the other state's portion of any oxbow lakes through which the Illinois-Missouri boundary passes, and may fish from or attach any device or equipment to land under the jurisdiction of the other state. Persons licensed in only one state may not fish in tributaries of the Mississippi in the other state. Anglers shall comply with the regulations of the state in whose waters they are fishing unless the regulations of their licensing state are more restrictive, then must comply with the more restrictive regulations. The center of the navigation channel is considered the boundary between Illinois and Missouri, except in situations where it is clearly shown to be elsewhere.

Illinois-Kentucky

Each state will recognize the sport fishing licenses and appropriate permits of the other state on the main stem and from the banks of the Ohio River, excluding embayments and tributaries where the Ohio River forms the state boundary. Embayments and tributaries shall be defined as a straight line between opposite points where the tributary or embayment connects with the main body of the Ohio River.

The fishing regulations adopted by the state issuing a sport fishing license apply to the licenses when fishing each state's respective waters, except that, all fishermen shall conform with the regulations of the state in which they are fishing, unless the regulations of the fishermen's licensing state are more restrictive, then the fishermen must conform with the more restrictive regulations. The regulations of the state where the sport fishing is occurring apply, if the licensee is fishing from the bank.

Wildlife law enforcement officials of either state shall have the right to inspect the licenses, harvest limits, creel limits, and equipment of any person on the Ohio River subject to the laws of either state.

Officers of Illinois and Kentucky will recognize and accept valid sport fishing licenses of either state when legally possessed and used on the main stem of the Ohio River, **excluding embayments and tributaries**.

Illinois-Indiana

Officers of Illinois and Indiana will recognize and accept valid sport fishing licenses of either state when legally possessed and used on the Wabash River forming a common boundary between Illinois and Indiana. Anglers shall not fish on water beyond the natural and ordinary river banks of the state in which they are not licensed to fish. Anglers shall not fish from land attached to or taxed by the state in which they are not licensed or fish in tributaries, bayous, or backwaters of the state. Anglers must abide by the laws of the state in which they are fishing.

VHS REGULATIONS

Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia


Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS) is a disease of fish caused by a virus previously unidentified in the Midwest. While it does not affect humans, VHS can kill a substantial number of fish and has been spreading throughout the Great Lakes.

The new regulations we are implementing are immediate and appropriate steps in trying to slow the spread of this dangerous aquatic virus in Illinois. Sport fishing and boating are both very popular and important to the Illinois economy. The cooperation of anglers and boaters is essential in combating VHS.

The new regulations being implemented by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) regarding VHS that affect **recreational anglers and boaters** include:

- Eliminating natural water from all equipment when leaving a body of water.
- Emptying and draining all bait buckets, livewells, baitwells, bilges, etc. or any other compartment capable of holding natural waters when leaving a body of water.
- Do not remove live VHS-susceptible species (see below) from any waters. Anglers may catch and keep VHS-susceptible species, but may not transport those fish live from the waters where caught.
- Use of wild-trapped fishes from within the state as bait will be restricted to the waters where legally captured.

While VHS is not known to be a threat to human health, anglers are still advised to wash their hands after handling fish and to cook thoroughly any fish they plan to eat. If handling dead fish or fish that appear to be diseased, protective gloves should be worn. LEAD TACKLE ADVISORY

The tackle industry, recognizing a growing awareness and concern about lead in the environment, has begun to create steel, tin, bismuth, or plastic sinkers. Consider using non-lead tackle when you go fishing.

Here's what you can do to help:

- Ask local sporting good stores to stock non-lead fishing tackle.
- Spread the word by telling other anglers about the problem.
- Dispose of old lead sinkers and jigs properly by locating a drop-off location.



MONOFILAMENT ADVISORY

Monofilament Can Kill

if not used or disposed of properly!

The Illinois DNR would like to remind all anglers that the improper use and disposal of fishing line (a.k.a. monofilament) can have a dramatic impact on our wildlife. In addition to being an eye-sore along our waterways, many shore birds, migratory birds, waterfowl, and raptors have become entangled in monofilament and died.

HOW ANIMALS COME IN CONTACT WITH MONOFILAMENT


There are a variety of ways animals encounter monofilament. Shore birds and waterfowl have been entangled in the litter while wading or swimming. Raptors and fish-eating waterfowl have ingested hooks and monofilament from fish that broke the line. Some migratory birds have used it as nesting material.

Starvation is the most common demise for animals encountering monofilament. The line wraps around the neck or accumulates in the stomach, preventing the ingestion of food. It can also immobilize the animals by wrapping around the legs, or securing them to stationary objects.

HELP FROM ANGLERS

Help from all anglers is needed to reduce the amount of fishing line in the environment. By using common knowledge and respecting our waterways, we can all help to reduce the risk of wildlife related mortalities due to monofilament.

- Properly dispose of unused monofilament in trash containers.
- Use the appropriate test line for the desired fish and fishing technique.
- Replace monofilament yearly. Replacing your monofilament annually can reduce the chance of breaking the line.
- Take the initiative while enjoying Illinois' waters. Help keep Illinois' waterways clean by picking-up discarded monofilament and tackle along the shores. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.


