April 2nd Tournament: *Spring Showdown*

On a cold, windy morning, the District 230 *Spring Showdown* kicked off the 2011 District 230 tournament series. When the boats dropped in the water, the water temp hovered in the low 50's, so fishermen were certain that the bite was going to be slow. Nevertheless, many boats caught fish: Marist #1, 1st place; Lake Park, 2nd place; and Marist #2, 3rd place.

Most schools reported catching fish off of timber on shorelines adjacent to deeper water. Also, schools caught fish on deep water ledges leading up to shallow flats. Although the weather was cold and the water temps were less than desirable, 11 boats brought in keeper fish to the weigh-in. Overall, nearly every boat reported catching fish, whether they were gar, bluegill, catfish, or bass.

April 9th Tournament: *Three-Rivers Qualifier*

The District 230 tournament directors, in conjunction with Maple Bassmasters, kicked off the second leg of the District 230 tournament series—*The Three River's Qualifier*. On the morning of the tournament, Mother Nature came out swinging with massive thunderstorms, dumping about 1" of rain into the river, followed by cold weather, misty conditions, and severe wind. When all was said and done, she cooperated by giving us a beautiful, 80 degree, sunny day (isn't that Midwest weather)!

When the tournament fishing started, boats began pounding shallow water in hopes of catching some pre-spawn fish. Unfortunately, the chill in the previous night's air pushed the fish deeper, and the rain muddied the water. So, boats were forced to run and gun. Most boats reported catching fish on main river structure, and few boats reported catching some keepers in back water areas. As the day warmed, more fish were caught because the water temperature spiked to nearly 56 degrees, 5 to 6 degrees warmer than a week earlier.

At the end of the day, Lake Park placed 1st, Brother Rice 2nd, and Andrew 3rd; and the weigh-in was spectacular! Maple Bassmasters ran the finest example of a tournament weigh-in ever seen. There were tents, chairs, tables, 2 scales, fish holding tanks, and a PA system to announce the student accomplishments. The aura surrounding the weigh-in had an Elite-Series feel to it, and the kids were overwhelmingly thankful. Also, many thanks go out to our tournament record keeper, John Wagner; assistant tournament director, Doug Kaufmann; IBFN treasurer, Jim Nelson; and Maple Bassmaster's tournament director, Joe Browning. With the second tournament of the series completed, the qualifying schools look forward to the Classic on May 21st at the DesPlaines Conservation Area.

Shore fishing 2011 was a blast! From April 4th through April 7th, the VJA bass club fished *Lake Sedgewick* in Orland Park. While at the lake, the club was divided half and half, some kids fishing for bass, while others were fishing for multispecies. Many fish were caught, including some beautiful bass and bluegill. Lake Sedgewick has been a yearly favorite for the VJA bass club because the setup is ideal for high school fishing, and many fish are caught on each trip.

The next trip took us to *Horsetail Lake* from April 11th through April 14th. During these outings, there were many "1st timers", and congratulations go out to Danyal Bhutto who caught his first fish ever on a bobber setup. Dan caught his beautiful bluegill, and his excitement was contagious. After Dan's fish, others caught some as well. Michael Kall came through with a largemouth bass on a wacky rig, and Richie Wren caught a largemouth bass on a shallow diving crankbait.

For both trips, the air temperature hovered in the mid to low 50's, and the water temp was well below that. The cold weather, windy conditions, and rain put a damper on some of the trips, but when the club made it to the lake, they put a hurting on the fish! The shore-fishing component of our bass club is the heart and soul of our program, and teaching students how to fish, enjoy the outdoors, and conserve our natural resources truly is an important goal of our club. As the year progresses, we will be taking shore-fishing trips to Plainfield Lake and Crete Monee Reservoir.

Tournament Practice

More than 4 times this spring, Coach Bartgen and Coach Arndt were forced to cancel pre-fishing trips to the DesPlaines River because of inclement weather. The VJA Bassmasters couldn't catch a break this spring. One day it was snowing, the other day it was raining, and another day there were 30-40 MPH winds. To make things worse, two trips to Wolf Lake were canceled as well. To remedy this issue, the coaches made it out to practice to help pre-fish.

When pre-fishing a body of water, many tips come to mind. First, it's important to understand the yearly biological stage the fish will be in. For example, if the water temps are 55-60, the fish will be pre-spawn/spawn. Once the spawn is over, the fish become slightly lethargic, so fishing styles must be adjusted to meet the fish's demands. The next pre-fishing tip that comes to mind is using electronics to determine water temp, underwater structure, and water levels. Finally, every good tournament angler uses the resources afforded to him or her by utilizing the internet, talking to local bait shops, networking with other local pros, and keeping a fishing journal from previous years.

Although the weather kept us indoors, the VJA club still had meetings and indoor preparations, which included tying on lures, checking rods and line, and doing boat checks. Coaches also gave a checklist to the students as to what to expect on tournament day, and the students did independent research on the tournament bodies of water to better their chances for success.

Because of the coaches' and students' hard work and commitment, the VJA Bassmasters qualified for the District 230 classic, which will be held on May 21st at the DesPlaines Conservation area from 6:00 am until 1:30 pm. Great work, Boys and Girls!

The 2011 IHSA Sectionals at Wolf Lake was exciting for all participants, and three lucky boats qualified for the IHSA State Tournament. Unfortunately, the VJA Bass Club did not qualify for the IHSA State Finals. Nevertheless, all coaches and student-anglers worked extremely hard doing research, pre-fishing, and preparing the boats and equipment for the tournament. The fish simply were hard to catch, and only a handful of keepers actually came to the scales.

The week of the tournament was miserably cold and rainy (5 straight days of rain), not to mention unbearable winds of over 30 miles per hour and frigid water temperatures around 45 degrees. Despite the terrible weather, the coaches were still able to make it out two days to pre-fish, and similarly to the tournament, not many fish were caught. However, many key spots were charted, and the student anglers worked hard all day fishing in hopes of bagging a keeper. April 21st was simply a tough day, but in the end, everybody involved had fun!

Other schools who fished in the Wolf Lake sectional included Chicago (Brother Rice), Chicago (De La Salle), Chicago (Harlan), Chicago (Harper), Chicago (Hubbard), Chicago (Marist), Chicago (Mt. Carmel), Chicago (St. Rita), Grant Park, Lansing (Illiana Christian), Orland Park (Sandburg), and Tinley Park (Andrew). Congratulations to Grant Park; Marist; and our sister school, Sandburg for qualifying for the 3rd ever Illinois High School Bass Fishing State Championship!

Fishing Tip #6: Tournament Strategy

Fishing a tournament is in many ways a mirror image of the planning strategies used for any fishing trip except there is appreciably more intensity. This is because you are not just focusing on your challenge of catching bass but also on how that performance will stack up on a given day with other very serious anglers. To make things work the best you will establish priorities that emphasize certain facets of the fishing strategy you are going to follow.

As we will discuss some of these will change as you fish during the day while others consist of covering a number of items before you hit the lake. In fact some of the most serious anglers on the circuits prepare by keeping a written daily log of the facts they want to refer to in the future and religiously refer to historical guide before they would consider fishing a tournament.

This base of data includes areas where fished, time of year, water temperature, wind, type of baits, as well as time of day and condition of sky (cloudy or clear). Folks that follow this kind of logging of information really take fishing to the level of a science. Since I do science for a living I don't go into the formal recording of daily activity while on the lake, but I do make a mental note of where, when, and how I caught bass. All this is even further of value if you can take the information and begin to put some thoughts as to why the fish were likely where they were in the equation.

The first thing you need to ask about a lake before you decide to fish a tournament is what do you know about the lake? If the answer is everything then skip this section, while the rest of us mortals look at some resources we need to consider using.

Logically a good map is an excellent starting point, and a topographic map, if available, is even better. These tools are only as good as your ability to supplement them with some local information. If you know a friend who fishes the lake then use that resource. If not then start with calling a marina and ask if they would suggest a guide with whom you could discuss the status of bass fishing in general and the most important issue of the lake condition in general. So is now time to start putting the information together into a strategy. You have the map and have gotten local information (if not then your only other pre-tournament option is a boat ride around the targeted arm of interest). Your choice of likely spots for tournament fishing should be tested in an attempt to give you as much information and flexibility as possible on tournament day.

For example an open-water spot may be great, but what if the wind gets high? Do you have fall back positions? Can you get to the fish from the launch site if it "comes a blow?" How much longer will it take to get there and how long to get back under such conditions? Macho boat driving is one thing, but hurting yourself or your partner is a whole other thing. Always watch the weather prior to a tournament. In the spring, winter and fall you will at least know if a frontal passage is likely and with it a strong shift in the direction of the wind. This isn't just for safety sake, but you may be forced to fish what the wind gives you on the more protected parts of the lake. If the front is likely to produce heavy rains several days before a tournament, don't place all your bets on areas that might catch rapid runoff and muddy quickly.

Another important question that may seem a little silly is what type of fishing do you want to do? Most folks are better or at least have more confidence in some types of fishing than others. If you like to flip, use soft plastics, crankbaits, spoons, etc, then concentrate in areas that play to your strengths.

Shallow and deep water bass share similar common habits. These include being where there is food, cover, or unique structure such as channels or wood lines. So use your depth finder to determine if there is forage such as schools of shad in the areas that you previously selected based on what you have learned from the map review as well as the information you either inherited from local fisherman or from your own boat ride on the lake.

It is always a tough call as to how far you should ride from the launch site to your fishing holes. It is a proven fact that you aren't going to catch a fish on the boat ride and the longer the ride the fewer casts you are going to get per tournament hour. It is also true that fishing close by in unproductive water isn't going to win many tournaments either. One obvious advantage of getting reasonably away from the launch site is that you should fish bass that aren't likely to get as much pressure from your competitors. This in itself is a real plus for me since I usually feel like I have a better chance when working areas that aren't beaten up during practice.

Speaking of practice, try to work, but not over work an area. As hard as it might be, make every attempt to shake off a fish rather than hooking them. Also it is important to cover as many spots with as many baits as you feel gives you good preparation. You are trying to establish where the fish are and note the position in which they are holding. It may be hard to realize it, but it is also important to find out what they are not hitting. Better to learn this in practice than in a tournament.

The final game plan should give you a group of spots that are similar and fall into priority categories. The first are those in which you have the most confidence. The more of these, the better your chances of getting into a pattern that you can stay with in part because they are consistent with matching your fishing style. The next group of fallback spots should be totally different and require different styles of presentations in different types of habitat. The last group of spots logically includes the rest of the lake and might be thought of "panic" or "last gasp" spots. Even here you should have a reason to select the area to try. It may be a change of depth, a place where wind action suddenly alters the previous high visibility, or some other unique reason to cast there.

The other aspect of preparing for a tournament is to see that your equipment is ready. Critical aspects such as sharpening hooks, putting on fresh line, and making sure the lures you want to fish are readily organized should be done the night before. If you really want to save time on the water deal with some of the time consuming tasks such as making up Carolina rigs by preparing several and wrapping them on a piece of Styrofoam and have these ready in your dry box.

Successful tournament fishing can best be achieved through careful prior planning, proper use of equipment, selection of multiple areas considered as productive, and as much fishing versatility in presentation as you can feel comfortable.

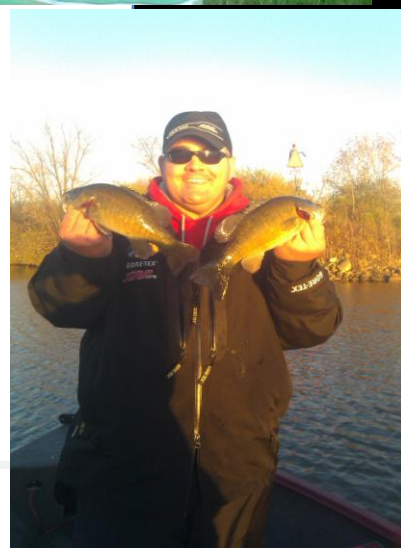
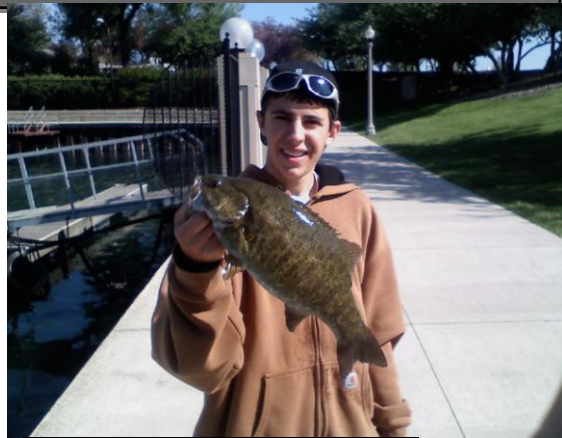

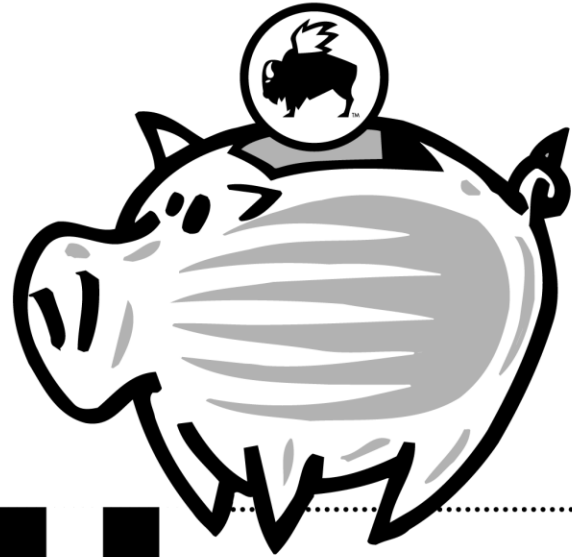
