Your editorial will be for the next issue of The Standard. The word limit will be 350 words. You are permitted to use an AP Stylebook and dictionaries. Type the final word count at the bottom of the story before turning it in. Entries will be judged on the quality of the arguments and writing, organization, and proper style and mechanics. At the top of your document, type "School Code: ####" with your individualized code numbers.

Submitted stories will be run through plagiarism software. If any submitted storied are flagged for plagiarism, the competitor and advisor will be alerted and given a chance to review and refute the flagged work prior to a decision on disqualification by a games committee.



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BACKGROUND INFORMATION

As budgets are being cut and school districts have to find ways to trim their finances, the AHS school board is voting next week on whether to issue a \$9 million dollar mission bond to be used to build a second gymnasium at the high school.

Opponents of the gym have taken to social media and attended community meetings to speak out against the plan, saying they don't want their taxes to go up to build something they believe isn't necessary to educate students.

Supporters, on the other hand, have defended the decision by a district Facilities Improvement Committee to include a new gym in the plan, saying it's getting more difficult to schedule activities, games and other events in one gym.

On February 1, voters will go to the polls to vote on the bond. If passed, the money would provide the funding to build, furnish and equip the addition of a gymnasium.

Superintendent Keegan Meyers:

We have experienced steady growth in our school and district over the past 15 years. Our gym classes are bursting at the seams and student involvement in athletics is at an all-time high. The addition of this second gymnasium will positively impact all of our students, as well as our community.

Athletic Director Nancy Pendergrast:

I understand the points being made against the second gymnasiums, but it's important to remember that athletics are an extension of the classroom. Extracurriculars are the carrot that help keep many of our students coming to school, engaged and eligible. If the new gym doesn't happen, we may be unable to field lower-level teams in some sports or cut athletes.

I am not opposed to athletics by any means. My son Ryan played soccer here and had a great experience. But, I believe there are greater educational facility upgrades and expansions that must be addressees before we consider a new gym. We are overcrowded for many required classes and enrollment is
