DIRECTIONS & RULES

You are a staff member of Abraham High School's *The Standard* (Middleland, Ill.). Your editor recently interviewed AHS alum Amber (Boring) Rutledge, who is the proprietor of Wild Harvest Honey Farms in Heyworth, Illinois.

Your editor believes that beekeeping is unique and would make for an interesting feature story. He has provided you with a recording of the interview he conducted with Amber to pull quotes from, as well as to gain background information on Amber and the farm.

The story word limit will be 500 words. In addition to well written and organized articles, judges will look for the use of an interesting lead, accurate details about the information provided by the subject, and proper style and mechanics. Students are permitted to use an AP Stylebook and dictionaries (non-electronic format only). At the top of your document, type "School Code: ####" with your individualized code numbers. Type the final word count at the bottom of the story before turning it in.

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BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Welcome to Boring's farm. Where a World War II and a flat tire led us to the Wild Harvest Honey Farms.

Beekeeping has been in our family for over 100 years. My great Grandfather Everett and Orinda were quite the duo. Great Grandpa Everett and his honeybees and Great Grandma Orinda keeping the family sour dough bread receipt going to eat with the amazing honey. We have traced the bread changing hands in the Boring family for at least 300 years. We learned this much in Orinda's book that was published about her life. "A Winter Lady" If you're lucky, some Saturdays we have free samples of it paired with the honey. As we still make the bread to this day.

Beekeeping has been a part of our family for over 100 years. Our goal here is to education the importance of bees for our survival.

Did you know one in every three bites of food depends on bees for pollination? That is why we have made it our mission to help our community repopulate and save the bees. Nearly one-third of all honeybees in the United States have died in the last few years. Scientists don't know the exact cause, but a growing body of independent science links a class of pesticides to widespread bee die-offs, both alone and in combination with other factors like disease and malnutrition.

Here at Wild Harvest we wanted to turn the land we grew up on and has been in our family for 3 generations and worked on by 5 generations into a bee sanctuary. All the proceeds from our sales will go into furthering education to those who want to learn about bees, help create a sanctuary, and protect the bees.
