Schedule: Check in for the state finals will begin at 7:45 a.m. (enter through door S2) with play

scheduled to start at Bloomington High School at 9:00 a.m. and around 9:30 a.m. at Illinois Wesleyan University. A complete schedule can be found on the esports page at

Events: Play will be conducted for the following games: Super Smash Bros. Ultimate (singles and

duos), Rocket League, and NBA2K. Each game will consist of 16 individuals or teams playing in a double-elimination format to determine 1<sup>st</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> place in each game. Each

bracket will be set up through a random placement of names.

Awards: Medals will be awarded to the first four place finishers in each game, and plaques will

be awarded to the school whose player or team finishes first in each game.

Peripherals: Rocket League

Students may bring their own peripherals, limited to officially licensed first-party

gamepads, (Xbox, PlayStation, Nintendo), keyboard, mouse, and necessary cable(s).

Mouse and Keyboards will be provided at the State Finals. Use of additional

tools/programs (including BakkesMod) during matches is prohibited.

# **SSBU**

Players who do not want to use the standard sideways Joy-Con may bring their own Dual Joy-Con Pro controller or Game Cube Controller with any necessary connectors.

### NBA2K

Players are allowed to bring and use their own approved controllers.

(Competing schools will be responsible for safety and maintenance of their own equipment)

Spectators: Limited seating for spectators to watch game play may be available, depending on



# **Directions from Bloomington High School to Illinois Wesleyan University**



Bloomington High School is located at 1202 East Locust Street in Bloomington, Illinois. Participating schools can park in either parking lot off Locust St. Please enter the south doors of the school for checkin.

The esports facility at Illinois Wesleyan University, site of Rocket League play for the IHSA State Finals, is two miles from Bloomington High School. On this map, Bloomington High School is designated as "A", while the Illinois Wesleyan University (IWU) esports facility is designated at "B".

Participants will be shuttled from Bloomington High School to IWU for the state finals since the IHSA esports state finals coincides with IWU's Commencement Exercises. While there is ample space for game play at the IWU esports facility, space for spectators to park and view the proceedings will be extremely limited. Bloomington High School will provide a stream of play at BHS for those interested in viewing.

To get to the IWU esports facility from Bloomington High School, travel west on Empire St to Fell St. At the stop light, go right. At the first stop sign, which is E. Emerson St., go left. At the first stop light, which will be Franklin St., go right. The esports facility will be on your right and is located at 1316 Franklin Ave.

# Do What's Right! Sportsmanship

### **DWR! EXPECTATIONS**

- Represent your school and community favorably through positive interaction with opposing fans and players before, during, and after the competition.
- Use positive yells, chants, songs or gestures.
- Display modesty in victory and graciousness in defeat.
- Respect and acknowledge the integrity and judgment of officials.
- Exhibit positive behavior in both personal interaction and social media comments.

# Acceptable Behavior...

- During the National Anthem, students, participants and fans should remove any hats, face the flag, not talk, place the right hand on the heart, and remain still until the end of the anthem.
- Applause during introduction of players, coaches and officials.
- Players shaking hands with opponents while both sets of fans recognize player's performance with applause.
- Accept all decisions of the game officials.
- Spirit Participants lead fans in positive support.
- Handshakes between participants and coaches at the end of contests, regardless of the outcome.
- Treat competition as a game, not a war.
- Coaches/players search out opposing participants to recognize them for performance or coaching.
- Applause at the end of the contest for performance of all participants.
- Everyone showing concern for an injured player, regardless of the team.
- Encourage surrounding people to display sportsmanlike conduct.

# Unacceptable Behavior...

- Disrespectful or derogatory yells, chants, songs or gestures.
- Booing or heckling an official's decision.
- Criticizing officials in any way; displays of temper with an official's call.
- Yells that antagonize opponents.
- Refusing to shake hands or give recognition for good performances.
- Blaming the loss of the game on officials, coaches or participants.
- Laughing or name calling to distract an opponent.
- Use of profanity or displays of anger that draw attention away from the game.
- Doing own yells instead of following the lead of spirit participants.
